

Region rejects town stop sign bylaw

STOUFFVILLE — Although York Regional Council rejected a Whitechurch - Stouffville bylaw to install a stop sign on Sunset Blvd. where it meets Albert St., a three-way stop there is in the works.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff told council that, "we feel there should be a stop sign on Sunset Blvd. going west at Albert St."

The town had passed a bylaw to that effect. The bylaw however must receive regional approval to become law.

The engineering report refused the request because of a "potential conflict between

southbound vehicles wishing to turn left and eastbound vehicles wishing to turn left."

The report suggested the single stop sign on Albert St. be retained.

Regional Councillor Ray Twinney, vice-chairman of the engineering committee, told council that the committee, "should take another look at it."

He favored a three-way stop and suggested the matter be referred back to the engineering committee.

Mayor Ratcliff said that the town would have to draw up a new bylaw.

Traffic jam problem

Court case delayed

AURORA — A Toronto traffic jam apparently delayed the York Sanitation Highway 48 dump case from coming to trial Thursday at small claims court here.

After recessing twice waiting for the York Sanitation attorney to appear, Justice of the Peace J. Sturch postponed the trial date until Dec. 4 at 2 p.m. He said there will be "no further adjournments" of the case.

It marks the third adjournment since the

trial date was originally set for June 24. It was later moved to Oct. 21 and then to Nov. 13.

Attorney for Whitechurch - Stouffville, Dennis Starczynski asked the court to proceed with the trial on Thursday since all witnesses were present at that time.

York Sanitation is being prosecuted under a Whitechurch - Stouffville by-law banning the dumping of garbage in the municipality.

The defense lawyer for York Sanitation arrived at the Com-

munity Centre building where the trial was to be held ten minutes after the case had been adjourned.

The attorney, J.M. Nesker, told The Tribune he "ran into the Peters girl funeral procession" in Toronto, so was unable to make it on time.

Mr. Starczynski said "I have no control over the justice of the peace and he won't proceed without representation for the defense."

"Maybe we'll get it tried Dec. 4," he added. "It might be my lucky day."

Called 'judgemental' Councillor assails report

YORK REGION — Markham Councillor Bob Adams angrily denounced a planning report Thursday on the effects of cancellation of the Pickering airport.

He charged that the staff "by inference" favors the project. The report was written by Chief Administrative Officer Jack Rettie. Mr. Rettie was not present at the meeting.

Mr. Adams said the report uses "could, would or might" all the way through.

"It is not a quantitative report, but judgemental," he added.

Newmarket Mayor Bob Forhan called foul. "He is talking about someone who isn't here," he said.

He suggested the matter be deferred.

Previously, the airport report had been received by council as part of the Planning Committee report. Councillor Adams had protested the vote, stating that he had comments to make on the matter.

"It looks like the planning staff is recommending the airport," he said. "The planners are neutral."

He read a long statement from a Town of

Markham planner which refuted some of the statements in the report and stated they were "not based on quantitative research."

"It's a waste of time to get into this thing at this time," Regional Chairman Garfield Wright said. "It is some implications of the cancellation of the airport on the Region of York."

Councillor Adams said that planning studies use mathematical formulas based on models.

Councillor Lois Hancey suggested that the vote accepting the report be rescinded. That passed.

Councillor Adams proposed that a preface be added to the report that, "all evaluations are judgemental and subjective and not based on quantitative analysis."

Councillor Alma Walker who agreed with Mr. Adams felt it was a "very, very biased," report in favor of the Pickering airport.

Planning Commissioner Murray Pound admitted that it is not an exhaustive report but said it was based on planning advice from consultants used by the federal and provincial governments on the airport project.

He said that staff had 10 days to prepare the report.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said that he could not accept the report if it was based on MOT fin-

dings saying that, "the MOT are biased."

"The problem is the way one person read the report and the recommendations arrived from it," Councillor Adams said. "Another person could have drawn different conclusions."

He admitted that many statements in the report were correct and conceded that cancellation of the airport would slow growth in the region.

Probation term after gas taken

YORK REGION — A 20-year-old Musselman's Lake youth pleaded not guilty to stealing gas from a summer resident of the area Aug. 16. After trial in Newmarket Court before Judge Ian Munro last week, Edward G. Morgan was found guilty, given a suspended sentence and placed on a one year term of probation.

Witnesses testified that the youth had been seen removing gas from a five gallon can near a boat at Cedar Beach. The gas was being siphoned from the can into a car in which Moran and his brother were driving.

Robert Randall told the court that he spends his summer weekends at a trailer at Musselman's Lake. He told the court the area has been plagued by vandalism to the point summers are being ruined.

"It is reaching a point where we have to take some action," he told the court. Mr. Randall added: "It may seem petty to lay charges over two gallons of gas, but after a while I think we have all taken enough" he said.

Morgan admitted to the court that he and his brother took the gas from the can, but said they thought the can was owned by a friend. He told Judge Munro he had offered to pay for it when he found out his mistake.

"It was foolhardy of him to take it, even if he thought it belonged to a friend" counsel for defence told the court. He claimed however that the 20-year-old youth, had not showed intent to steal. Crown Attorney Bill

Gorewich said that all facts indicated theft. He said witnesses had "said it all, when they talked about vandalism in this particular area."

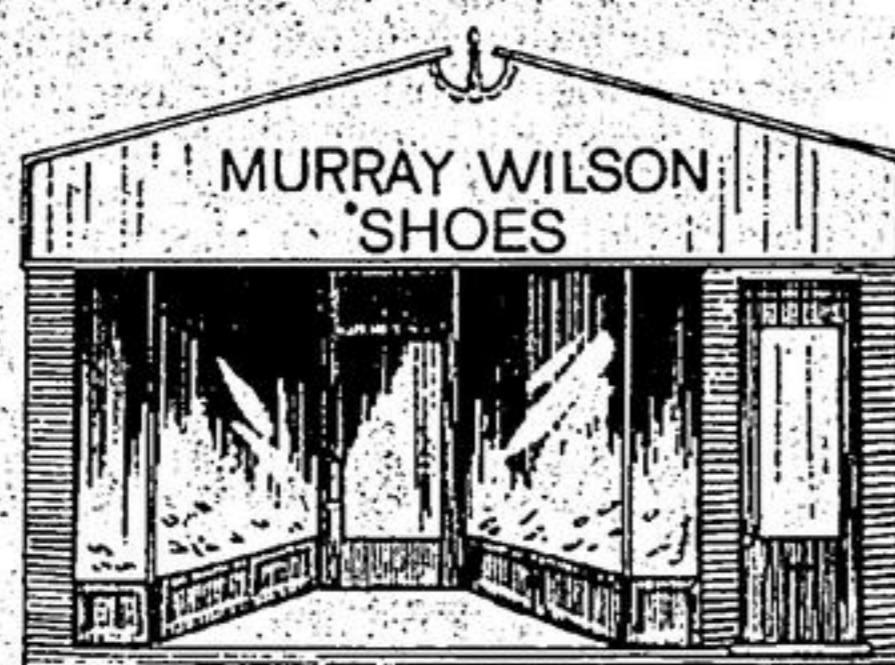
