Darcy McKeough says

Cedarwood will come

PICKERING — The North Pickering Project will be built, but it "will not cost the region of Durham," Ontario Treasurer Darcy McKeough told regional council last week.

Councillor Jack Anderson (Pickering), however, was not reassured. "He (McKeough) had his head

in the sand," he told The Tribune. Mr. Anderson said that until the provincial government "has come up with a large single factory," or other industrial incentives, that Pickering should oppose the project.

While no guarantees of incentives were given, Mr. McKeough did say that North Pickering

would pay for its own servicing. He also added that the North Pickering Development Corporation "has a great deal of tools at its disposal to attract industry."

Mr. Anderson feels that the project should probably be built in stages, with industry guaranteed for each part before building. Other-

wise, he fears a rise in the tax rate for the municipality. Mr. McKeough also told regional council the province has no immediate intention of reviving the Pickering airport, and that to make North Pickering self-sustaining, other industry would have to be attracted in the area.

Regarding a plebiscite on the airport being introduced by Oshawa Councillor John DeHart, Mr. McKeough said the province wasn't prepared to govern on the basis of plebiscites.

Uxbridge seniors apply for housing

UXBRIDGE — Applications are being received for the senior citizen's residence being constructed here, with over 50 applying to date.

The building, to be operated by the Ontario Housing Corporation, is to have 51 units. To apply, seniors must be 65 years of age and an Uxbridge resident.

OHC housing manager Mrs. M. Sevcik said that 43 applications received so far are from

the village of Uxbridge, with the remaining 12 coming from surrounding areas.

The basis for selecting residents for the building will be "need," Mrs. Sevcik said. A waiting list will be kept for those not chosen the first time around.

Applications may be obtained from the Township of Uxbridge, office.

The building is located behind Uxbridge Cottage Hospital.

Mayor heads regional study

UXBRIDGE — Mayor Carl Putebaugh will head up a regional committee that will investigate Bill 162, which established the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The ad hoc committee is to look at "all aspects of Bill 162" the mayor told The Tribune. Water and sewer rates remain the biggest problem, he added; and "under Bill 162 it can't be solved."

Another problem is the provision under the bill which says that council acts as a recreation committee for the municipality. "It isn't physically possible," said the mayor. "We've organized another way and it's illegal."

The committee will bring recommendations to council following separate investigations by the members.

Seven spots chosen for possible pen site

UXBRIDGE — A penitentiary reception centre, if built here, will not be located on prime agricultural land.

That's all Uxbridge planning and development chairman Bill

Ballinger would say about seven possible sites within the township selected for the centre. Final choice of a site resides with the federal penitentiary services branch. They will choose among the Uxbridge

locations as well as several sites in Scugog Township.

The seven potential locations in Uxbridge were selected "jointly" by the township and a penitentiary services representative, Mr. Ballinger said.

When asked if any worked out gravel pits were being considered for the centre, Mr. Ballinger replied "no comment."

He said the township now "cautiously awaits the response" from the federal branch.

Clippers win, tie close games

STOUFFVILLE — Strong performances by Chris Clarridge and Bill Meakes highlighted an otherwise mediocre performance by the Stouffville Clippers. Lack of finish around the opponents' nets resulted in Stouffville gaining only one instead of four points over the weekend by virtue of Saturday's 6-6 tie with league-leading Cobourg.

In Sunday's 6-5 loss to Port Perry, the May Real Estate crew duplicated their performance of the previous night by dominating play in periods two and three only to see their efforts wasted by poor play

around the Port Perry net. Saturday's seesaw affair was a real crowd pleaser as Cobourg quickly tied the score 1-1 with a Kevin Barrick goal on passes from Mike Splonnick and Wayne Norton. Port Perry soon jumped to 3-1, however on Bill Whitelaw goals.

ville dominated the play, but the Flamings went up 6-4 on tallies by Bill Thorton, Carlo Camazola and Dean Morgan. Kevin Barrick got Stouffville back into it with three minutes remaining on a power-play goal set up by

solid goal after a shaky start. Defensively, Clarridge was outstanding, blocking five shots in one shift.
