CLAREMONT — Albert Hockley's 25th year competing at the Royal Winter Fair was one of his best.

This year, the R.R. 1, Claremont resident was awarded the Canadian Horticultural Council

International Award and was champion in the seed potato exhibit class.

"This was my 25th year, so I had to dig in a little bit," Mr. Hockley said. He took top prize in the commercial feature potato class, Sebago potato table stick class and the Sebago seed potato class at the fair.

For his efforts, he won a silver tray, a \$100 cheque and his name was engraved on the championship trophy.

His top competitor came from a Prince Edward Island woman, he said. Mr. Hockley had first decided to get into the fair competition, 25 years ago, when he heard some "P.E. guys" saying on the radio that they had won most of the awards in the Sebago potato classes.

Mr. Hockley set out to change that — and he succeeded well. In later years, he won firsts in 75 per cent of the classes he entered, he said.

Mr. Hockley's interest in growing potatoes started at a very early age. "When I was a kid,"

he said, "I used to like to stay home to pick potatoes."

Regarding his competitive growing, he said that "once you start, you don't want to quit." Mr. Hockley grew his championship potatoes on three and a half acres of land devoted to the crop.

In the past, Mr. Hockley has been a leader in the 4-H Club, and taught his charges the characteristics to look for in a good potato — "uniformity, size, shape and color."

The Royal Winter Fair ran through Nov. 22 and attracted competitors from across Canada and the U.S.

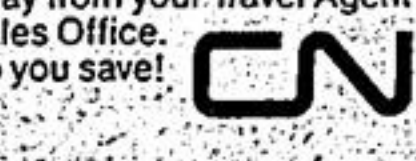


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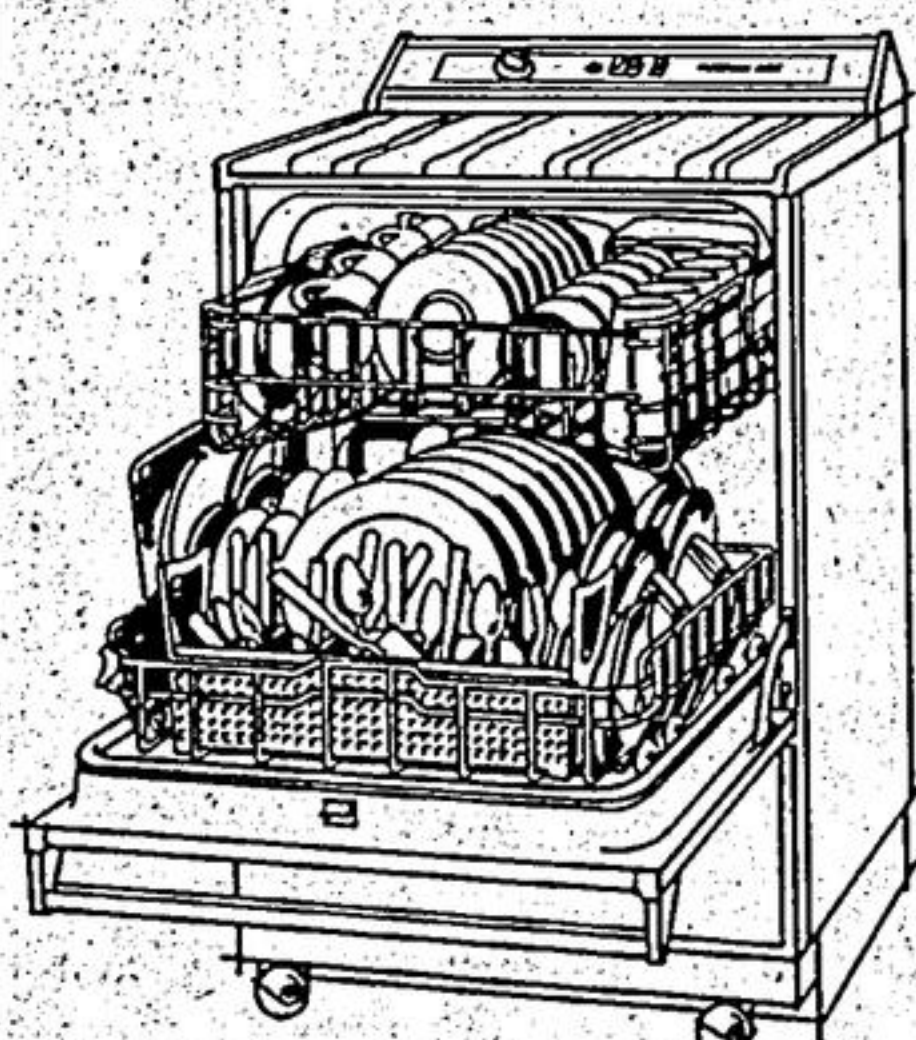
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
