Near upset in encounter

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville Clippers nearly pulled an upset win against the Markham Tier 2 junior A team last week, losing a squeaker 2-1. Two third period Clipper shots that hit posts would have given Stouffville the game.

Scoring opened at 8:40 on a power-play marker by defenceman Chris Clarridge from Peter Fitzpatrick and Doug Taylor. The Clippers held the lead until 5:11 of the second frame when former Stouffville Juvenile Matt Leslie scored from Ed Olsen and Willers. Markham's Mark Salaluk then notched the winner thirteen minutes later.

Both teams missed great scoring chances in the rest of the game. Doug Feasby showed why he's with Markham (and occasionally the Marlies) with much tricky stickhandling. Doug Todd wasn't able to play as the Marlies faced the St. Catharines Black Hawks that night.

Rick Marshman and Jack Holder in Stouffville net held off strong Markham threats through the game and the Taylor-Wrightman-Fitzpatrick line played extremely well.

The Clippers plan another Markham Match on Tuesday, Jan 6, 1976 with either the "A" Waxers or the "B" Royalls.

Clippers fall apart in 10-4 trimming by Lindsay

STOUFFVILLE — Following their strong effort against Markham, the Stouffville Clippers came apart at the seams Friday and were outclassed 10-4 by Lindsay.

On Saturday, they reversed their fortunes again, beating Frankford 9-5.

In the Lindsay contest, only second period goals by Doug Taylor, midjet Glenn Gibson and Ted Assinck and a third period effort by Taylor kept the May Real Estate squad from humiliation.

Lindsay scored after only 58 seconds of play and held period leads of 3-

0, 5-3 and 10-4. Clipper goalies Jack Holder and Rick Marshman shared netminding chores, together stopping 22 shots.

Lindsay now leads the seven-team junior "C" loop with 22 points. Against Frankford on Saturday, the Clippers solidified a fifth place in league standings with a win.
