## Cachet ratepayers speak

# Two groups clash

CACHET — An active ratepayers association, representing a majority of residents in the Devil's Elbow - Cachet Estates area of Markham, has made its views known with regard to future development of that district.

However, some non-members of this organization have op-

posite opinions and this led to confusion at a special meeting of Town Planning Committee, Nov. 26.

The main problem relates to five blocks of undeveloped parkland. A certain number feel it should be built upon, if for no reason but to discourage the prevalence of booze and

pot-smoking parties, motorcyclists and snowmobilers.

The Association, however, does not agree that house construction should be permitted on these sites, at least not yet. But members voice no objection to the development of the Buttonwood Golf Course. On the question of one or two-acre lots at this location, the Association wants assurance that no water or septic tank problems will result, before it will approve a 58-home, build-up rather than twenty-nine.

Don Hindson, solicitor for the ratepayers, said it was not his intent to "set up opposing camps". "If everyone intends to make a 'pitch' to the Committee, then you don't need a lawyer," he stated.

He observed that while some residents appreciated privacy, others were opposed to what he described as "a community of isolationism". He said he was certain, with a little time and additional discussion, a more concentrated position could be achieved.

He called it "a heaven-sent opportunity" that the solicitor for the developer and the Planning Committee for the Town, were both willing to reach a decision that would serve the best interests of everyone.

Councillor Carole Bell said, in her opinion, the request for more time was "fair and valid". She suggested that provisions should be made for some recreation facilities. "to what extent, must be decided," she concluded.

## Airport concerns unanswered

PICKERING — Most of the concerns expressed by council regarding the Pickering airport site have not been handled yet by the federal government, Mayor George Ashe said last week.

While the government has announced they will demolish some 15 substandard homes in answer to council's request, they have not returned roads to municipal jurisdiction, the mayor said.

The town will maintain the roads through the winter and charge the cost back to the federal government, he said.

Council also asked that senior levels of

government help pay for fire-protection in the northern part of town and that a grant-in-lieu of taxes be paid for airport homes.

## Objections to new city

PICKERING — The North Pickering project would benefit Toronto to the detriment of Whitby and Ajax, Durham West MPP Charles Godfrey said in Committee studying housing last week.

He asked Housing Minister John Rhodes to stop the new planning community.


## St. Bernards drag tress for charity
