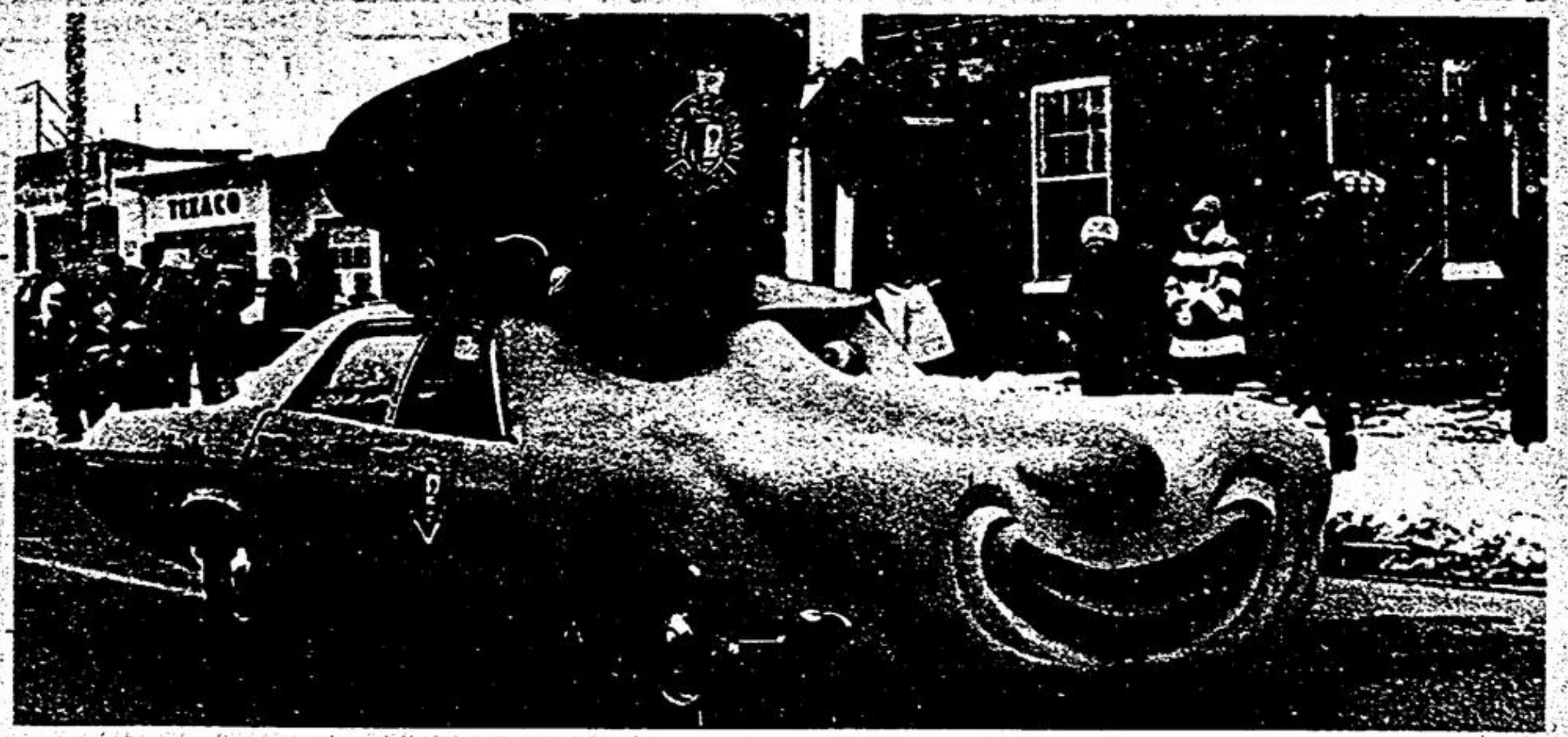

Firearms ban map shows built-up area prohibition

STOUFFVILLE — Council last week as shown the preliminary map designating areas where no discharge of firearms will be allowed.

Bylaws Committee Chairman Art Starr presented the map, asked council for comment and explained the map will be forwarded to the Whitchurch - Stouffville Conservation Club for comment.

According to the map, use of firearms will be prohibited in the former village and the area would extend from the town line to midway through the 8th concession. Councillor Becky Wedley suggested this area be extended westerly to include Ringwood and the rest of council agreed.

Hunting will also be forbidden in the Vandorf and Preston Lake areas. This zone tentatively extends from Wesley Corners (Aurora sideroad) on the north to Bloomington Rd. on the south. On the west side

lots, built around a large pond that already exists on the property.

He said that each lot would be about 1.3 acres, although 22 acres would be owned in common. A bicycle path would also be a feature of the development.

Councillor Elfred King said that "in all fairness" he should explain that the land did not meet regional criteria for estate residential. The criteria include — rolling topography, dense trees and land unsuitable for agriculture.

"We have rejected plans that have come closer to meeting the regional criteria than this one," councillor Art Starr said.

Mr. Hurlburt rebutted that the land is not owned by a farmer at present and is surrounded on two sides by a golf course, with a large bush in the southeast corner.

"It's not going to be farmed and would be more useful and give more tax revenues to the town this way," he said.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said that an application had been rejected on land south of the proposal.

Councillor King added that there are "many acres" of land in Whitchurch - Stouffville which lend themselves to estate residential development.

"Land that is valuable for food production, should stay in food production," Councillor Merlyn Baker said.

Road work still 'unsatisfactory'

LEMONVILLE — The town has extended the letter of credit for the Ratcliff subdivision as some required work has not been completed satisfactorily.

The letter of credit for \$62,559 was to expire February 15 but it has now been reduced to \$30,000 and extended to June 30.

A letter from the town's consultants, Giffels, Davis & Jorgenson Ltd., listed unsatisfactory road work. Points mentioned were: shoulders, insufficiently compacted, ditches incomplete in many sections, ditch seeding was not carried out by commercial means, street signs and lights have not been installed, fine grading of ditches will be necessary in the spring and in some places the ditches have not been adequately defined.

Charles Ratcliff was to appear at last week's council meeting as a deputation but he cancelled the appointment.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said he had been speaking to the developer and that Mr. Ratcliff wanted the letter of credit reduced to less than \$30,000.

The mayor said he backed up the engineers' recommendations 100 per cent.

Council accepted a further recommendation from the consultants that building permits be issued once the matter of extending the letter of credit was settled.

The developer will be required to give an undertaking in writing that the work be completed by June 1, 1976.

THE PUBLIC'S RIGHT TO KNOW

The recent release by the Environmental Hearing Board that heard the argument for approval of the waste disposal site, completely ignored the most critical aspect of the problem, namely, pollution by chlorinated hydrocarbons. Broadly speaking these represent a new and by far the most dangerous form of chemical poisons.

There was no evidence to show how York Sanitation Co. was going to prevent the migration of these poisons into the aquifer and the Ministry stated they had parameters for the safe operation of a site handling these chemicals. The only conclusion one can come to is that the Hearing Board completely ignored this most critical aspect of the citizens' argument. We quote, "The Board realizes that a contaminant movement from the site is a possibility whether the site is closed or continued in use. If the site is engineered and operated in the future, to the satisfaction of the Ministry requirements, the Board believes that any problem related to the contaminant plume from the site will not be increased significantly, if at all."

The Board's opinion runs counter to the experience of the United States which has shown that bodies such as polychlorinated bi-phenols penetrate the soil without restraint and end up in groundwaters. There are numerous other chlorinated hydrocarbons that are also not retained by any significant degree by clay-like bodies. When it is realized to what degree the Great Lakes are already contaminated by polychlorinated bi-phenols, which is a persistent and extremely toxic chemical, and further, when it is realized that the safe limit probably is only 0 or possibly one part per TRILLION, the concern of the citizens is understandable. Even heavy metals which should have been retained by the soil at the dump site have migrated beyond the dump boundaries and phenols is found at the Town's wells in concentrations well in excess of any reasonable background level. There is little doubt that migration of these "exotic" new chemicals will similarly occur, and when the synergistic effect of chemical mixtures on the human body is taken into account, there is real reason for immediate concern by every parent or would-be parent in the Town.

We believe the Ministry of the Environment should come to a public meeting and explain to the citizens, just how they propose to preserve the purity of our water. Frankly, we don't believe the dump can be justified on any basis and the citizens of this Town have a right to know, right now, what the hydro carbon content and composition of their water is, both before and after the chlorinator.
