## Guidelines accepted by Region

**YORK REGION** — A letter from provincial treasurer Darcy McKeough concerning the government's anti-inflation program sparked some debate as to whether the guidelines are binding on regional employees when it was tabled at regional council last week.

Richmond Hill Mayor David Schiller questioned whether the federal controls apply to regional and municipal employees. The treasurer's letter stated that the provincial government would apply the guidelines to its employees and suggested the region do likewise.

Mr. Schiller, however, wondered if the regional staff comes under the "administrative control" of the federal anti-inflation board.

East Gwillimbury Mayor Gladys Rolling insisted that Mr. Schiller's remarks were beside the point, stating that, "we are here to say that a good program and we support it."

Councillor Bob Adams insisted that Mr. McKeough's letter itself represented the official guidelines.

Mayor Schiller persisted that "It should be made crystal clear by the 'province,'" and maintained that the federal regulations are not binding on provincial and municipal employees.

Mr. McKeough's letter was accepted by council.
