The Claremont area Senior Citizens will hold their first meeting of the New Year, Thursday, Jan. 8 at 1:30 p.m.



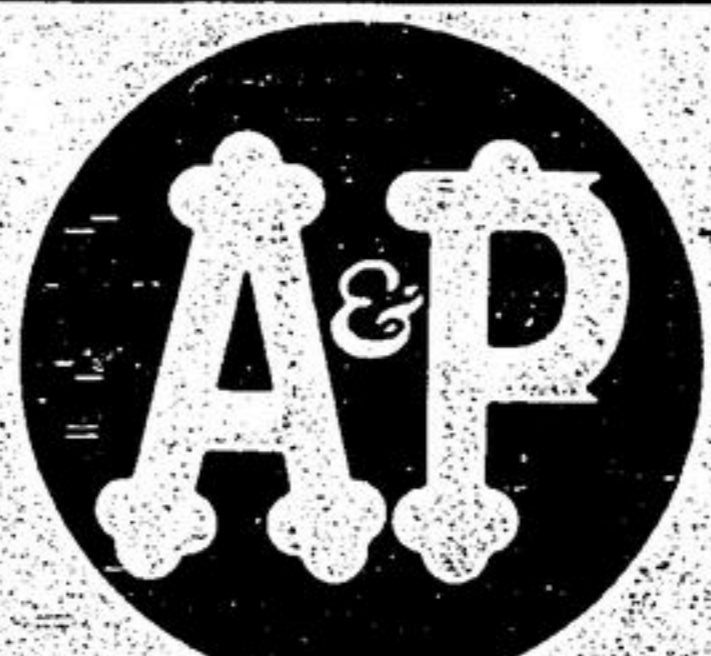

Renewal stickers on sale already
Ontario's Transportation and Communications Minister James Snow has announced that the 1976 licence renewal stickers for passenger cars and trailers went on sale December 1, and has urged motorists to purchase their renewal stickers early at any of the 296 licence issuing offices throughout the province.

"The introduction of the licence sticker system has resulted in fewer long lines at licence issuing offices as the deadline approaches," the Minister said.

"We hope motorists will purchase their stickers early again this year."

The 1976 validation stickers for passenger cars are blue in color; those for trailers are red. The fees remain the same at \$23 for a 4-cylinder car; \$32 for a 6-cylinder; \$40 for an 8-cylinder car; and \$5 for trailers.

Simplified renewal application forms containing an insurance declaration are available again this year at all provincial L.C.B.O. retail outlets, as well as at licence issuing offices.

Failure to affix the sticker by the required date is an offence under The Highway Traffic Act of Ontario.

Owners of motor-assisted bicycles are reminded that licence plates for mopeds and drivers' licenses for drivers of such vehicles also become available on December 1st.

Under the new legislation, there is an annual registration fee of \$5 for the operation of a motor-assisted bicycle.

GOODWOOD — Although he lived in Uxbridge the last nine years of his life, Charles Wesley Watson could be called a fixture in Goodwood where he owned the General Store for some 43 years.

Mr. Watson was born in the hamlet on Aug. 25, 1897, the son of David and Florence Watson. He attended Goodwood Public School and married Etiole Forsythe. She predeceased him some 20 years ago. He operated the

general store here in 1923 and became postmaster in 1936. He retired with his second wife Alice to Uxbridge, until his death last week.

Mr. Watson served overseas with the Canadian armed forces during World War I and was an active member of the Goodwood United Church throughout the years.

Besides his wife, he leaves two sons, Claude of Goodwood and Dean of Uxbridge; two sisters, Myrtle Watson and Mrs. Mildred Hynes; and a brother, Everett. He is also survived by six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.
