## Junior 'C' Clippers grab third place, crowding second

STOUFFVILLE — Outstanding weekend performances by Ted Assinck, Kevin Barrick and Andy Leitch vaulted the Stouffville Clipper junior "C" hockey team into third place, one point behind Port Perry.

Friday night the Clipper crew edged Lindsay 4-3 and before a big home crowd on

Saturday, the Ken May Real Estate squad tied Port Perry 4-4.

At Lindsay, it was a tight affair as Lindsay took a 2-0 first period lead on Ken Anderson and Dave Poole goals. Andy Leitch narrowed the gap early in the second period on a pass from Dave Mumford, but shortly thereafter, Steve

Richardson put Lindsay up by two.

Forty-five seconds later, Leitch scored again from Mike Splonnick and the goal seemed to ignite the Clippers. Scott Connor tied the score at 19:20 on a perfect Chris Clarridge pass. With just 10 seconds left in the game, "Teeder" Assinck notched the winner as

Lindsay's Steve Brookes skated from the penalty box.

The victory was the first for the Clippers on Lindsay ice and the product of a determined team effort.

Saturday night's contest was a real crowd pleaser for the 500-plus spectators on hand as the Flamings and Clippers traded goals all evening.

After just 18 seconds of play, Assinck opened scoring. Kevin Barrick got the assist. Port Perry's Scott Robertson tied the score midway through the period, but 31 seconds later the Assinck-Barrick combination struck again. This time Mike Splonnick joined the play. Forty-two seconds later, it was Splonnick who did the honours from

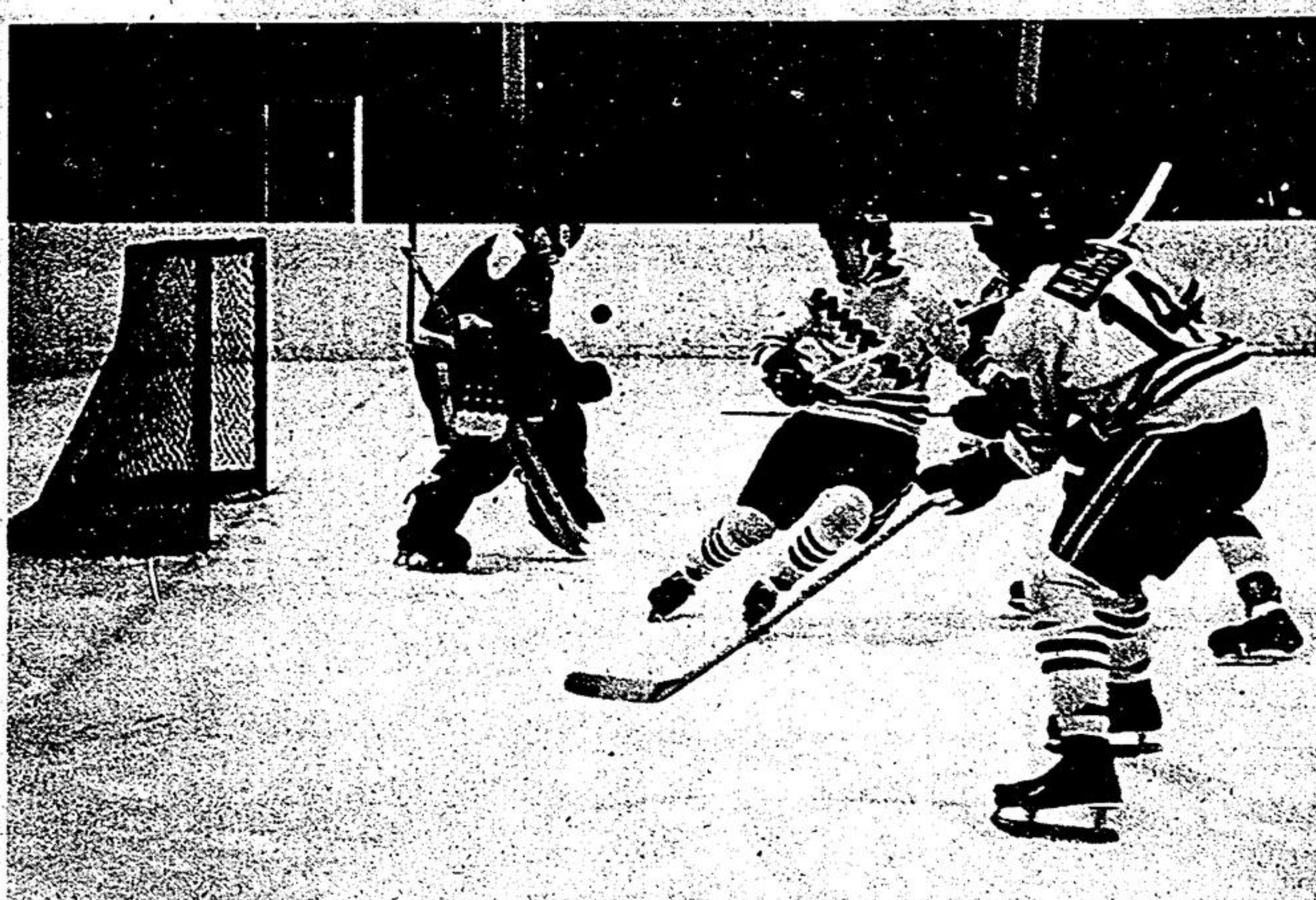
Assinck and Barrick as Stouffville led 3-1. Carlo Cammazzola brought Port Perry within reach at the period's end.

Phil Cochran tied the score with the only tally of the second period while Barrick traded goals with Cochran during the final frame to leave the teams tied at four apiece.

Rick Marshman played well in the Stouffville net, just as sidekick Jack Holder had done the night before in Lindsay.

The Clippers play Tuesday against Bowmanville, but results of the game were not available at press time.

Nick Bangay and Joe Palmer also rebounded strongly for the Spartans. The midgets now have a 2-2 record while their Huron Heights opponents boosted their record to 5-0.

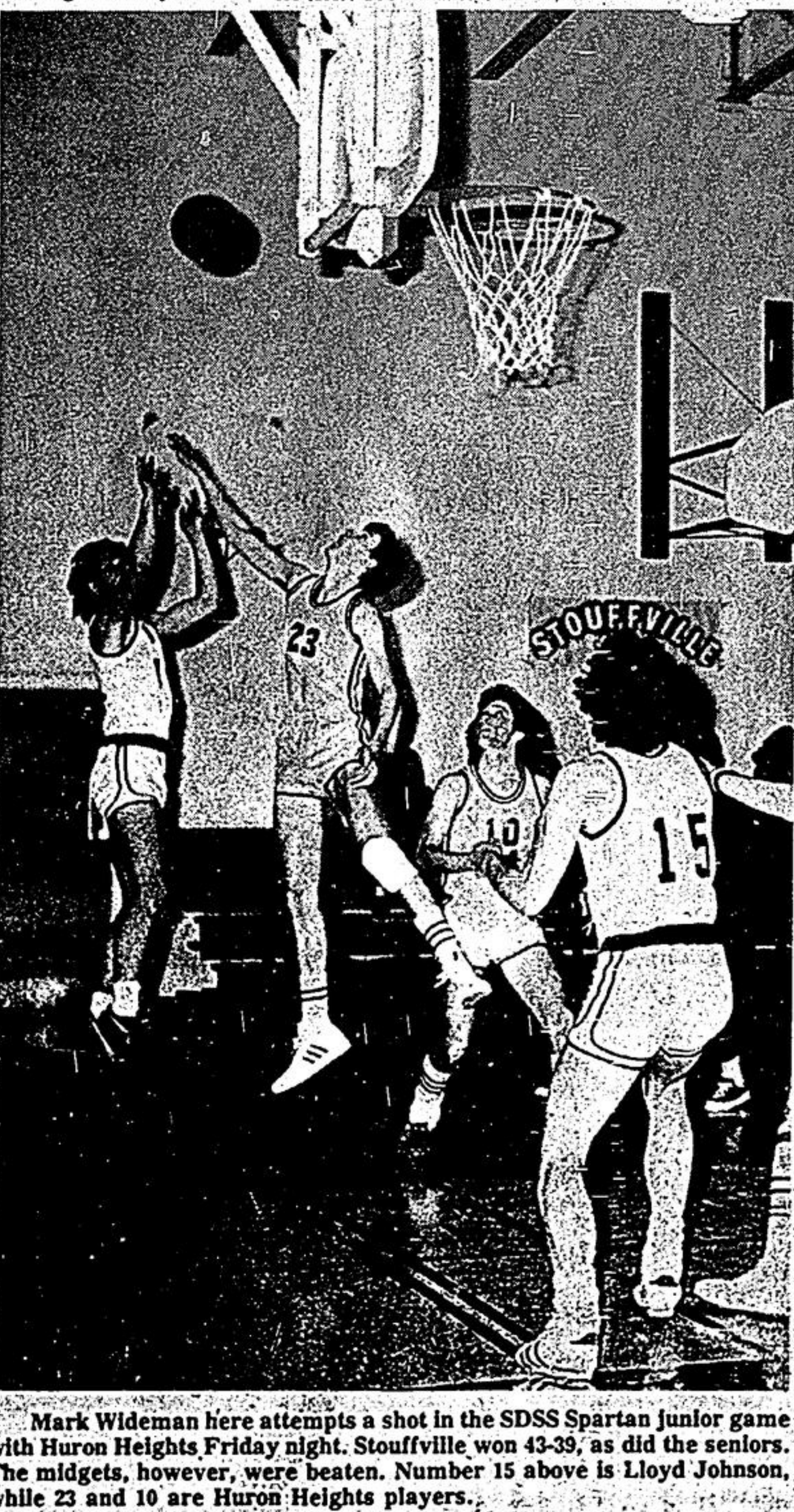

## Snowmobilers need written permission to avoid trespassing fines

The Ontario Provincial Police reminds snowmobilers that as of Jan. 1, new regulations came into effect governing snow vehicles.

A fine of up to \$500 may be incurred for trespassing on land without the written consent of the owner. The OPP says. On public roads and trails, protective helmets are required while riding on snow vehicles, and operators must have a valid Ontario drivers licence to drive along a highway.

All snowmobilers must be registered with the nearest licensing office regardless of registration in previous years. The vehicles must be registered within six days of purchase.

Snowmobiles are to stay off the serviced portion of main and secondary highways, from shoulder to shoulder, and may only cross them at a 90 degree angle.

Furthermore, 30 miles per hour is the speed limit on highways with limits over 30, while 15 is the limit on highways posted under 30 miles per hour.
