## Driver education fees retained

YORK CTY. — A bid to increase driver education fees for York

Region night school students was turned down here last week.

While trustees approved holding the student fee at \$70 for 25

hours of in-class instruction and 18 hours of in-car training, they did approve increasing fees paid to the regional driving schools.

"They get all the benefits of lower insurance while we pay the cost," he noted.

Markham trustee, Don Sim opposed the unsuccessful amendment.

"To put an amendment in at this time is a mistake," he explained.

Should the board's costs rise, an increase could then be considered, the Markham trustee added.

As trustees turned down Mr. Laird's amendment, the Georgina representative described driver education classes as "a rather limited program."

It is now a course which is suspect in its results.

A staff recommendation that the fee be increased from \$9.25 per hour to \$10.50 per hour was accepted when trustees were told, "with the increasing numbers of students requesting driver education, staff believes that it will be possible to retain the present fee of \$70."

Georgina trustee Bill Laird led the fight to increase the student fee to \$7.50.

"I'm just a little concerned," he told the meeting. "Driver education in the United States is not as beneficial as was thought."

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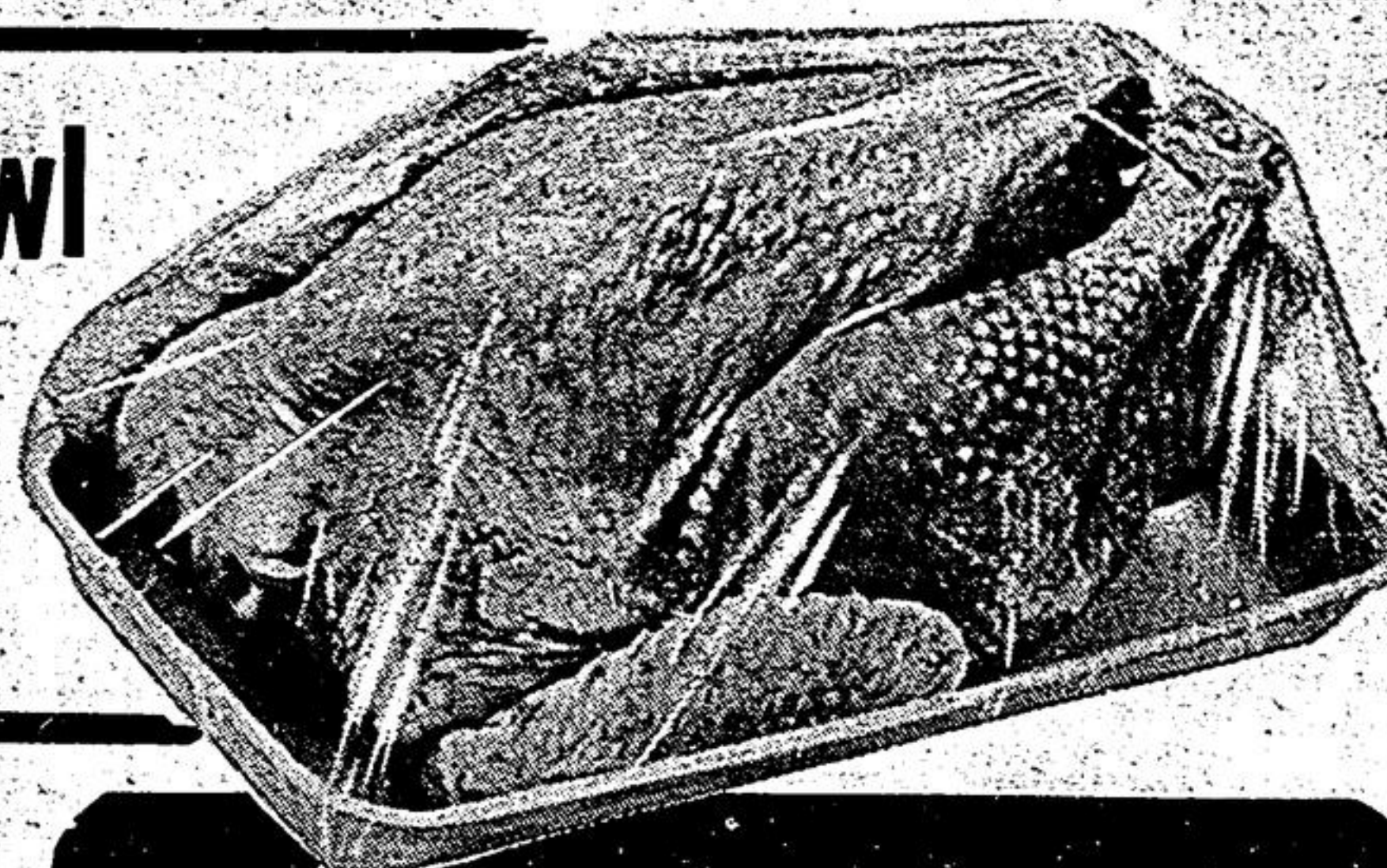
