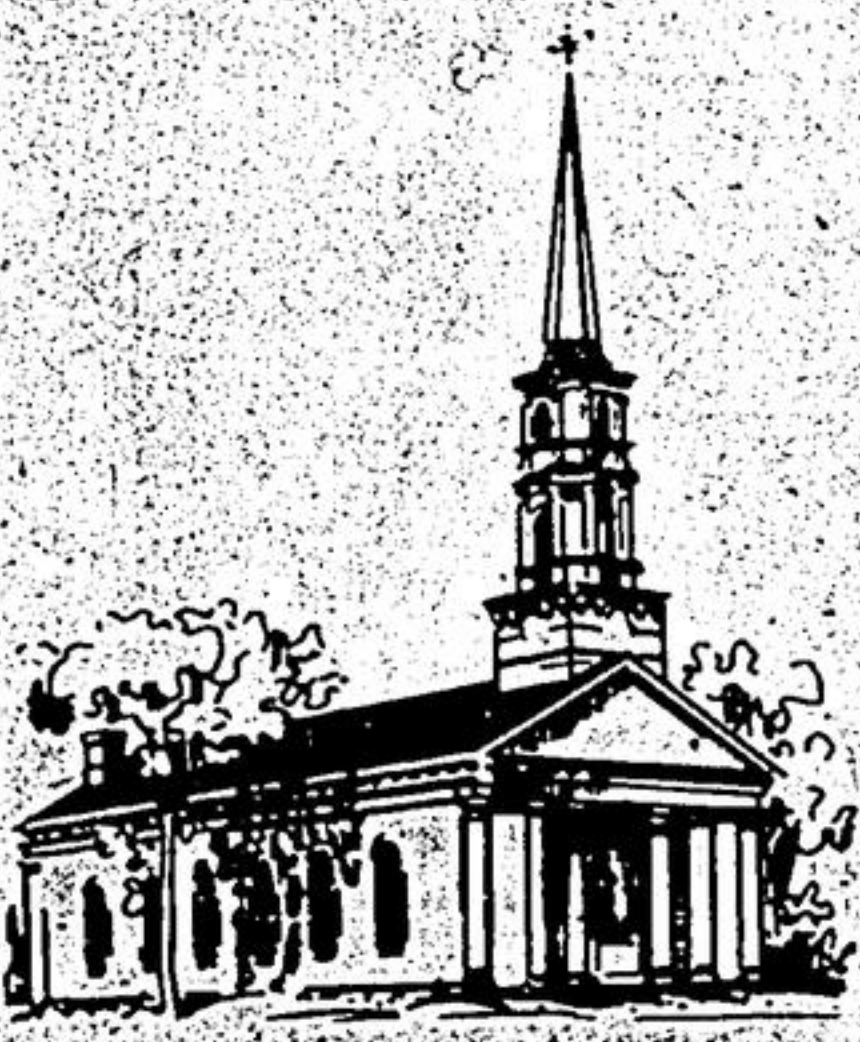

Indian legend makes fascinating book

Star Maiden: An Objibwa Legend of the First Water Lily, by Patricia Robins, illustrated by Shirley Day; Collier MacMillan; hardcover; \$5.95. This book, written by a local author, has claimed the publisher's prize for outstanding juvenile literature. It has been accepted by public library boards and acclaimed in the United States and is presently being translated to appear in Japan. The story of the creation of the first water lily is drawn from painstaking research of an Indian legend. The research is not visible and the happy result is a story that an adult may read with enchantment to a child and that the child may rediscover and re-read on his own. The book is generously illustrated. The pictures are drawn from the simple forms of Indian rock carving and are unusually and successfully united with the text. Any child fortunate enough to be read or to read this book will remember the gentle Star Maiden all his life, where ever he sees a water lily floating. It is as delightful to discover a book dedicated to children who ask questions as it is reassuring to know that there is an author capable or replying with simplicity and wisdom inherent in an intelligent imagination.
