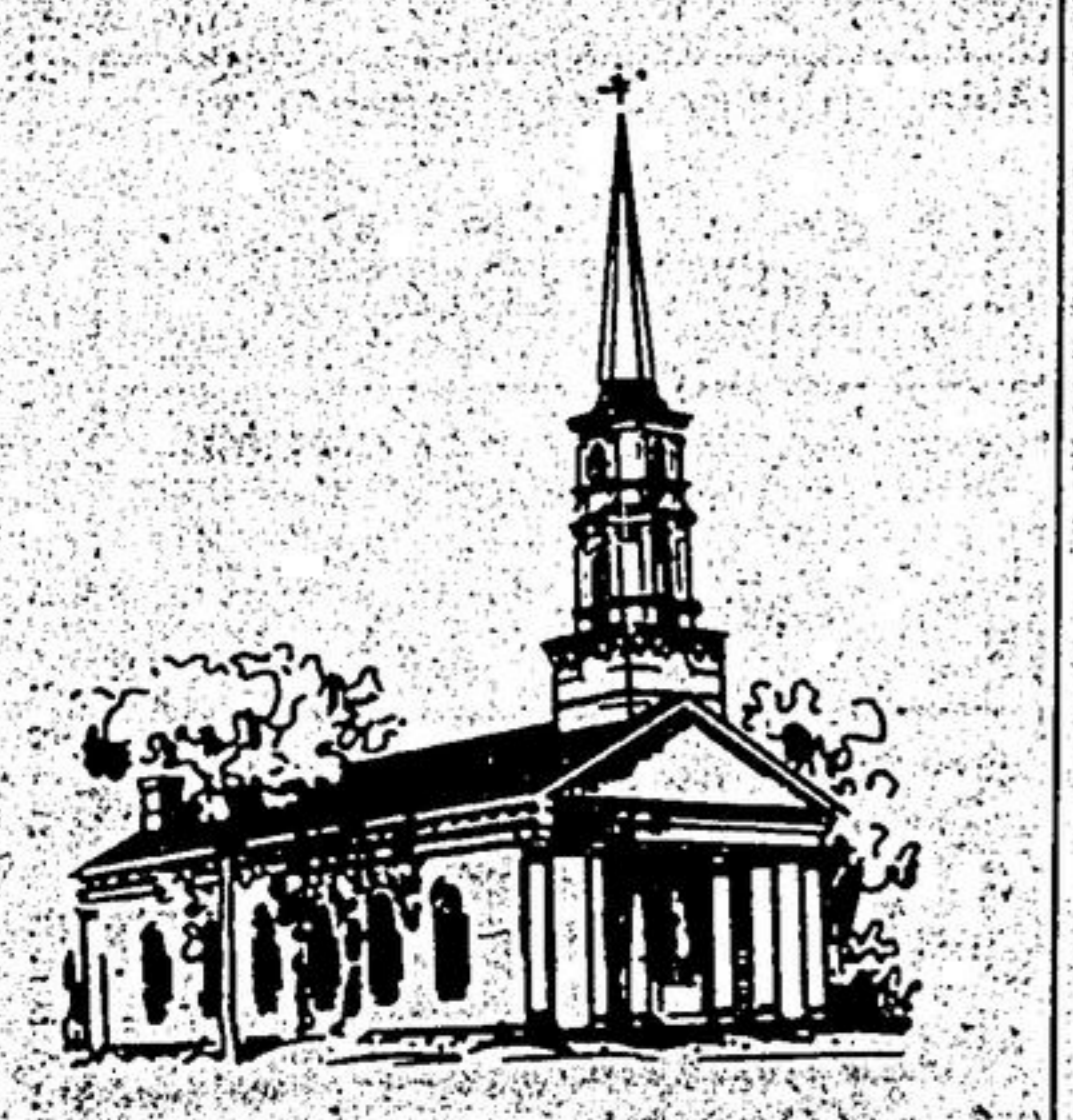

# Practical application for religion course

STOUFFVILLE — The 32 students in Grade 5 at St. Mark's Separate School are learning first hand what it means to give of themselves to others.

The students spend an hour and 20 minutes each week at the Stouffville Nursing Home visiting residents. The students have "adopted" the senior citizens.

Last week, in a touching gesture of thanks, one of the residents presented the class with a hand-made doll house.

The idea originated with Grade 5 teacher Randy LaMorre. The children had visited the nursing home to sing Christmas Carols and "the senior citizens really enjoyed the children."

He then thought about visits on a regular basis. He told The Tribune that it fits in well with the Grade 5 religion program which has the theme of giving to others.

It brings the classes down to a practical level. Each child has adopted a senior citizen. For instance Linda Butler, a student, is

teaching Mrs. Rita McNeill how to do some of the modern dances. She is presently learning the "Bump", and according to Linda "She's okay."

Theo Vanderbarst spends his weekly visit playing checkers with Ron Fields. The children have a sort of tournament going.

But last Wednesday, the residents had their chance. Harold Shant presented the doll house, which had taken him seven months to build.

"The doll house meant a lot to him," Mr. LaMorre said. "He wanted to show us his appreciation."

The doll house will be on display at St. Mark's School.

Some of the children are involved reading stories to elderly people who cannot see. Others exchange jokes. One woman wanted a youngster who could tell jokes and there happened to be a joker in the class.

One elderly lady wanted to learn hymns, and one of the students is teaching her. Another young lady is swapping recipes and cooking tips with one of the residents.

Mr. LaMorre said that the children hope to

prepare a banquet in social studies are brought into the visits, but Mr. LaMorre feels that it is primarily part of the religion course.

"It's been really good for the children," he said. "The parents have heard nothing but good comments about it."
