The couple had known each other for some years before that, since the Bakers had operated the store at Almira, while Mr. Houck's family farmed on the 6th Conc., just south of there. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Houck.

kept foster children. She taught in the Sunday school and sang in the choir at the church.

They are still members of the Melville church.

The couple have two children, John of Markham and Marilyn (Mrs. John Dors) of Scarborough. There are six grandchildren — Timothy, Kimberley and Kerri Lynn Houck and Eileen, Christine and Kevin Dors.

While Mr. Houck did mixed farming on his 70-acres, in the later years he kept sheep and ponies and those were his hobbies. In 1963 they sold the farm.

The couple's main enjoyment now is their cottage on Hall's Lake, north of Minden. Mr. Houck works a small garden there where he can "exercise myself a little bit."
