William Harold Carson Former farmer dies at 83 years

CLAREMONT — William Harold Carson of R. R. 2, Claremont, passed away in Fairview Lodge Saturday, March 6. Willie, as he was affectionately called, was in his 83rd year.

His health had been failing for some time and he had been a patient at Fairview Lodge for two years.

Willie was the eldest son of Robert Carson and Barbara Forgie. His father died in 1917 and his mother in 1961 at the age of 90 years of age.

Willie moved with the family from west of Dunbarton in 1909 to farm Lots 7 and 8, Conc. 6, where, for the past 67 years, milk has been shipped to Toronto from the Carson farm. In recent years, nephews Alan and Grant Carson have owned and operated the dairy farm.

Mr. Carson was predeceased by one sister Mary (Mrs. Irving McAvoy) in 1935 and two brothers — Roswell, who died as a prisoner of war in 1918 and Errol, a veteran of World War II, who died in 1946.

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THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK KENNEDY ROAD (Regional Road No. 3)

THE COUNCIL OF THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:

The widening and reconstruction of Regional Road No. 3 (Kennedy Road — 6th Concession Line North) in the Town of Whitchurch, Stouffville from approximately 1500 feet south of its intersection with the 25-26 Sideroad to approximately 2300 feet north thereof, with additional widenings at cuts and fills and the intersection; the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading and graveling thereof to provide a two lane basic roadway, together with the construction of culverts, drainage works and all related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.

The Engineering Committee of the Regional Council, will, at its meeting to be held at 2:00 p.m. on the 13th of April, 1976 at the Engineering Building on the west side of Woodbine Avenue one and one-quarter miles north of the Aurora Side Road, hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor, or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard.

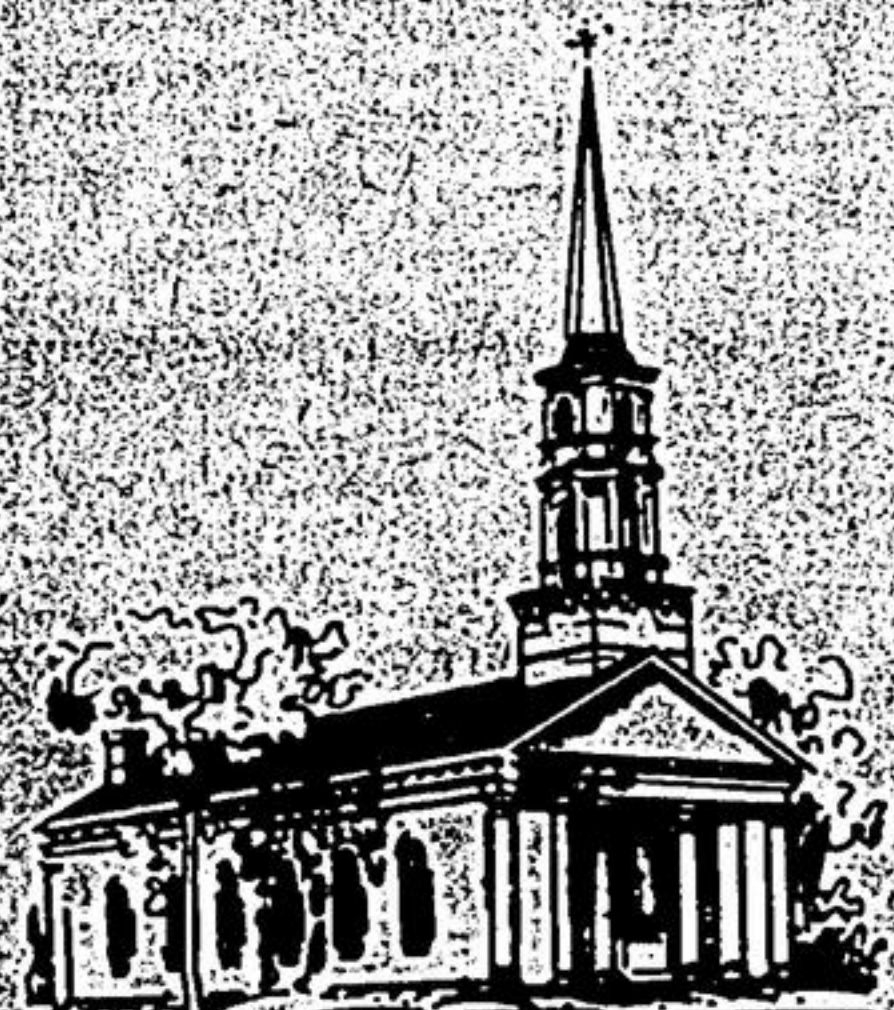
