Peewees up in finals

STOUFFVILLE — The Birkett Hassard peewee hockey team took a two-game advantage in the provincial finals after a heart-stopping 6-4 overtime win in Delhi, Tuesday night.

With the Stouffville goalkeeper pulled at 14:18 of the third period, Andy Redshaw tied the score at 4-4 from Tony Leger. Stouffville added two more in the overtime period to win it.

The series continues this weekend with two games at the Stouffville Arena. They are: Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 3:30 p.m. and Tony Leger who also singled a goal. Daryl Norton helped on two goals and Andy Redshaw on one.

Delhi goalgetters were Mark Stefan, Steve Stewart and Rory Ebdon.

The game Sunday in Stouffville marked the local peewee A's first loss in 12 straight play-off encounters. Delhi won it 5-3.

Mark Boudway, Daryl Norton and Tony Herold each tallied in a losing cause while Tony Leger assisted twice and Jack Postma, Barry Greenshields and Kevin Barley once each.

Encephalitis hazard

Anti-mosquito action approved

PICKERING — In order to curtail the dangers of St. Louis encephalitis, a three part program, including spraying, public education and elimination of breeding grounds, have been approved by the Pickering executive committee.

Although the regional medical health officer, and representatives of the Ministry of the Environment told the committee it is impossible to determine if there will be cases of

encephalitis caused by mosquitoes, the committee still voted in favor of the measures.

Local citizens will be encouraged to clean up debris or stagnant water areas where mosquitoes are likely to breed and a similar program will be carried out on town land.

The motion also says that Pickering should negotiate with Scarborough to have both sides of the Rouge River sprayed. The Ontario Ministry of Health has promised provincial funds to finance spraying operations west of Toronto.

Pickering firemen get raise

PICKERING — First class firemen in Pickering will now make \$16,394 per year, according to a contract recently ratified with the Pickering local of the Professional Firefighters Association.

The contract allows a 7 1/2 per cent salary increase, life insurance benefits were raised from \$15,000 to \$20,000 for firemen and from \$10,000 to \$12,000 for dispatchers.

The two year agreement calls for the deletion of service pay based on number of year's service and the firefighter's association will henceforth supply bedding in the fire halls.
