THE COUNCIL OF THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:

The widening and reconstruction of Regional Road No. 3 (Kennedy Road — 6th Concession Line North) in the Town of Whitchurch - Stouffville from approximately 1500 feet south of its intersection with the 25-26 Sideroad to approximately 2300 feet north thereof, with additional widenings at cuts and fills and the intersection; the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading and gravelling thereof to provide a two lane basic roadway, together with the construction of culverts, drainage works and all related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.

The Engineering Committee of the Regional Council, will, at its meeting to be held at 2:00 p.m. on the 13th of April, 1976 at the Engineering Building on the west side of Woodbine Avenue one and one-quarter miles north of the Aurora Side Road, hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard.

Markham transit users to pay more

MARKHAM — Beginning Monday, April 19, a partial fare increase will go into effect for adult and student users of Markham Transit.

On this date, the adult fare will be 35 cents, the same as on the T.T.C. Yonge Street line. Students will pay 25 cents.

Taking these increases into account, the Town's Transit Committee has been able to prepare its 1976 budget with no additional deficit.

It means, committee chairman Walter Grieve told the Economist and Sun, that 51 cents of every dollar in transit operating costs, will be paid out of the fare box. This, he said, is in line with provincial policy.

"This enables us to live with the reduced level of subsidy from the province, even though our costs have increased," he explained. He noted too, that no additional burden

Misled police

NEWMARKET — A 19 year old Markham man who told York Regional Police his employer's truck had been stolen was convicted last week of misleading police.

Bruce Cotton pleaded guilty before Judge Ian Munro and upon conviction was placed on a six month term of probation.

While driving the truck through fields the youth had rolled the vehicle and he was ordered to pay damages.

Cotton's lawyer told the court his client took the vehicle because he thought it was "a neat truck."

He abandoned the truck in a field in Durham Region and then contacted York Regional Police and reported it had been stolen.

The counsel pointed out that Cotton had suffered already as he lost his job as a result of the incident and he asked Judge Munro for a conditional discharge on the grounds that Cotton is a first offender.

Grant awarded

THORNHILL — Transport Canada has awarded a grant of \$2,447,860 for the construction of a viaduct over CNR tracks on Bayview Ave. in the Region of York.

Announcement of the grant was made recently by Urban Affairs minister Barney Danson MP for York North on behalf of transport minister Otto Lang.

This grant brings the total federal contribution in the Toronto area for grade separation projects to \$10.5 million for beginning in 1976. The grant is being made under terms of the railway relocation and crossing act. CN will contribute an additional \$62,500 with the balance of \$3,713,100 project being borne by the province and the municipality. Work is expected to begin sometime this year and should be completed in 1977.
