

Peewee A's clinch OMHA championship

STOUFFVILLE — The Birkett-Hassard peewees became the first Stouffville team ever to accept an OMHA championship trophy at the Stouffville arena Sunday after they dumped Delhi for the Ontario title.

Stouffville took the series in five games, dominating the last two games 7-3 and 4-1 at home to clinch it.

Earlier, the B-H'ers edged Delhi 4-3 in an away encounter, but lost 5-3 back in Stouffville. The next game was a 6-4 overtime win for Stouffville in Delhi.

The last game of the series on Sunday was a scrappy, hard-fought affair but with only 12 penalty minutes assessed against Stouffville and 14 for Delhi.

Scoring opened at 10:55 as team captain Tony Leger, with one man down, rammed it past Delhi goalkeeper

Scott Miller. Jack Postma and Daryl Norton assisted.

The second goal came in the second period, when Stouffville, again down a man, slipped another one through. Leger tallied the goal from Postma. Delhi managed their first and only goal with 2:30 remaining in the period as Gary McConnell skated the goal in unassisted.

At 11:55 in the final period, Stouffville's Daryl Norton let one fly from the blueline to make the score 3-1. The puck glided over the shoulder of the Delhi goalie for the tally.

Just one minute later, the last score of the day and the series was made as a Jack Postma shot was deflected and arched into the goal. Andy Redshaw assisted on the play.

The game on Saturday saw Stouffville

move into the lead early and hold it through the contest. Three first period goals and one early in the second gave the B-H boys a 4-0 edge before Delhi finally hit the scoreboard. Goal-getters were Leger from Postma and Tony Herold, Norm McKenzie from Barry Smith, Robert Gierkink from Bryan Todd, and McKenzie from Dave Mehaffey and Barry assisted.

In the last period, Mark Boardway opened on an unassisted goal for Stouffville before Delhi captain Michael Maezz tallied from McConnell. Leger retaliated at 6:07 on passes from Gierkink and Norton. Two minutes later, Delhi's Doug Ferris soloed. The last goal went in 26 seconds before the final buzzer, with McKenzie picking up his hat trick as Mehaffey and Barry assisted.

Mike Rehill served solidly in the nets for Stouffville in both games.

The game Saturday was another low-penalty affair, each team getting only 10 minutes.

Winning the right to enter the series with Delhi at all was no easy matter. Stouffville defeated Alliston with four wins and a tie in a series that included three games that went into overtime and two that were decided by one goal margins.
