**Peewee B's win league title in 3 straight**  
STOUFFVILLE — Another championship trophy was earned by a Stouffville team last week as the Stouffville Credit Union peewee B's defeated Port Perry for the Lakeshore League

championship. It was the town's first peewee B title. The best-of-five series was captured in three straight wins by Stouffville, 5-3, 6-3 and 4-1.

In the final contest, at home in Stouffville, Port Perry scored their first and only goal early in the game on a shot by Todd Healy from Brian Mikkelsen. Stouffville took over after that to earn the victory. David Pearce first tallied from Larry Fockler on a deflection shot. In period two, Mark Leslie scored on a passing play from Pearce and Fockler. The Port Perry goaltender kept the score down by fending off a host

of other attempts in the period. The last period saw Leslie pick up his second marker after an initial shot by Fockler. He tucked the puck high in the corner for the goal. At the 13:00 minute mark, Fockler scored on a pass from Pearce to end the scoring.

In the first game of the series, Scott Frisby tallied twice and assisted once for Stouffville while David Pearce collected three assists. Single goals went to Mark Leslie, Dale Leger and Phillip Faulkner. Greg Redshaw had one assist.

Neil Williams, Todd Menzie and Brian Micholson scored for Port Perry. The second game saw Port Perry jump to a 2-0 lead although goalkeeper Ray Dart turned aside a total of 21 Port Perry scoring attempts in the first period. Stouffville soon stormed back in the game, firing five straight goals before allowing another from Port Perry. David Pearce was the scoring ace in the game, netting three goals for Stouffville. Greg Redshaw, Dale Leger and Larry Fockler had single tallies and Frisby, Fockler, Redshaw and Leger had assists.

The team's coaching staff summed up the series victory with these words: "We have to give credit to the whole hockey club as each one of these kids gave a thousand percent."

**THE TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE**  
THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:  
The widening and reconstruction of part of the sideroad lying between Lots 25 and 26 in the 5th and 6th Concessions in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville to a basic width of 86 feet from approximately 1500 feet west of the road allowance between Concessions 5 and 6 sometimes known as Kennedy Road to approximately 1500 feet east thereof with additional widenings at cuts, fills and the Kennedy Road intersection; the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading and graveling thereof to provide a basic two lane roadway together with the construction of culverts, drainage works, and all related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.  
The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville will at its meeting to be held at 8:00 p.m. on the 27th day of April, 1976 at the Council Chambers, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard.

**New town well ready this year**  
STOUFFVILLE — Mayor Ratcliff said it is expected that the new well will be in operation sometime this summer. The remainder of the homes in the Northdown subdivision have approval contingent on installation of the new well.
