

## SDSS successful in first track meet

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville High School track team got off to a great start this season at the Blue and Gold Warriors Meet, held at the Port Credit High School.

John Christie, competing against the track powers of Toronto, cleared well over 20 feet in the long jump event and set a new meet

record. He also leaped 40 feet in the triple jump event, good enough for second place. He had to drop out because of an injury shortly afterwards, and settle for fourth position.

David Dart hurled the Midget Discus 141 feet, placing second, and also had the fourth best put in the shot-put event.

Tim Brazier, in spite of being knocked down and injured, managed to stagger back on the track and place sixth in the 3000 metre event, competing in a field of 29 runners.

# New executive named at WSMHA meeting

STOUFFVILLE — Witchurch Stouffville Minor Hockey Association executive were elected last week at the annual meeting, for a two year term.

The usual term is for one year but to facilitate co-ordination of a centennial project it was decided to lengthen the term by a year.

Because of a new ruling introduced last year, which specifies that four members of the executive must have been on the previous executive.

President John Wilson and Treasurer Ed Grimshaw did not resign with the rest of last year's executive, but continued on in their positions without standing for re-election.

Other members of the new executive are: Vice-president Eldon Wagg, Secretary Bob Dart, House League Convenor John Wilson, Referee Manager Dave Bourne, OMHA Convenor Ken May, and Assistant OMHA Convenor John Hutchinson.

Mr. Grimshaw has also been named Operations Co-ordinator to form subcommittees for the centennial year and to try to set up a women's auxiliary which

would be responsible for selling tickets and providing refreshments when the association is hosting other teams.

According to Mr. Wagg the centennial project will likely be chosen at the next executive meeting, to be held June 6.

There was a good turnout to the Thursday night meeting and several amendments to the constitution were passed.

Two amendments, which make parents of children registered in the hockey program members of the association

and give them voting privileges, were passed.

There was considerable discussion about the portion of the amendment concerning voting privileges as the resolution specified there would be only one vote per family.

John Brunke protested against this condition on the grounds that "if a father and a son are both actively participating then only one is entitled to a vote."

The resolution was amended to allow "parents" to vote.

The resolution to decrease the executive from nine members to seven was also passed.

This was done because of an organizational change which eliminates a separate convenor for each of the five house leagues and puts them under the control of one convenor.

A non-executive manger will now be appointed for each of the house leagues. The intent of appointing one convenor is to have that one person co-ordinating the

playoffs, which have caused problems lately.

Another problem area has been allocation of ice time and it is hoped this can be eliminated by placing it under the jurisdiction of the Assistant OMHA Convenor.

A resolution was passed giving the executive the authority to remove any member of the executive who is not fulfilling his duties. The replacement, according to the resolution, would

be the man who polled the next highest number of votes at the annual meeting.

Several other points of contention were brought up and referred to the new executive.

The midgets came up against a strong team and lost 32-0 in the first 14 minute game but played much more strongly in the second, losing only 8-3. Russ Harrison scored Stouffville's points on a penalty kick. The Intermediate Spartans displayed considerable speed and strength when the whole team shared the scoring in 10-4 and 28-0 victories over the Brock team.

Both the junior and senior rugger squads will be competing in the York County championships being held Thursday, May 13 at Fletchers' Field in Victoria Square. The contests begin at 1 p.m.
