Brock dump decision out

TO THE RESIDENTS OF GREENWOOD AND AREA:

On May 7th the Environmental Appeal Board handed down a decision on the use of the 750 acre Brock North landfill site.

Metro Toronto will only be allowed to use 110 acres in the extreme south west corner for landfill as the remainder is environmentally sensitive.

This order by the Board brings to a close a five year battle over garbage.

I stated in Council tonight that if we receive an ironclad guarantee that the remaining 640 acres of the Brock North site will not be used for landfill that I would recommend the residents accept the decision and allow finalization of the agreement between Pickering and Metro.

I invite your comments.

W-S—There were 32 fires in Whitchurch-Stouffville during 1975 and they caused an estimated \$386,484 in losses.

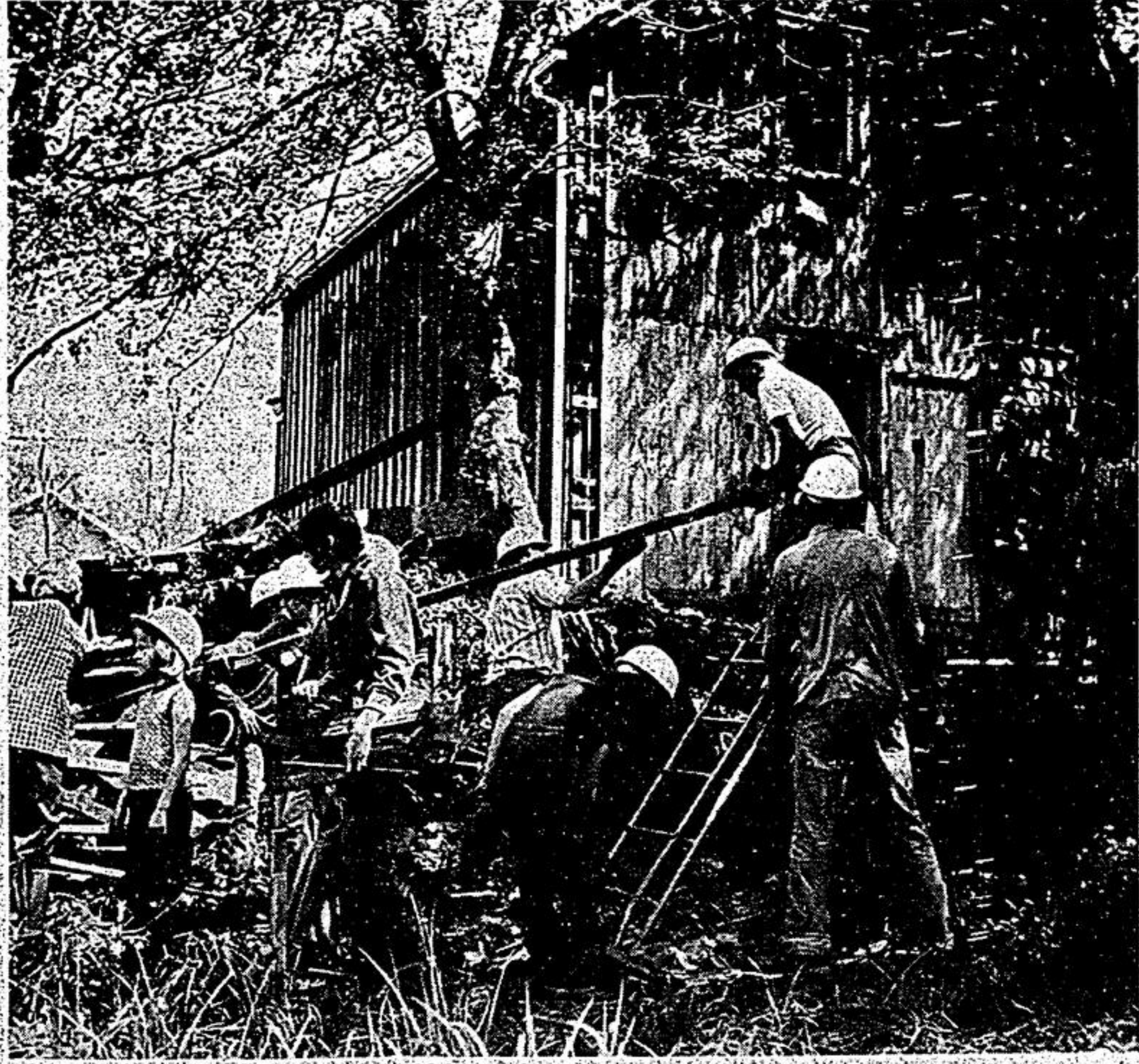
The average number of fires per year during the five year period from 1971-75 is 36 with damage running at \$442,644 per annum.

This information comes from the Office of the Fire Marshall in their annual report.

Markham, in contrast with Whitchurch-Stouffville, had an amazing total of 105 fires that resulted in only \$594,448 worth of property damage.
