

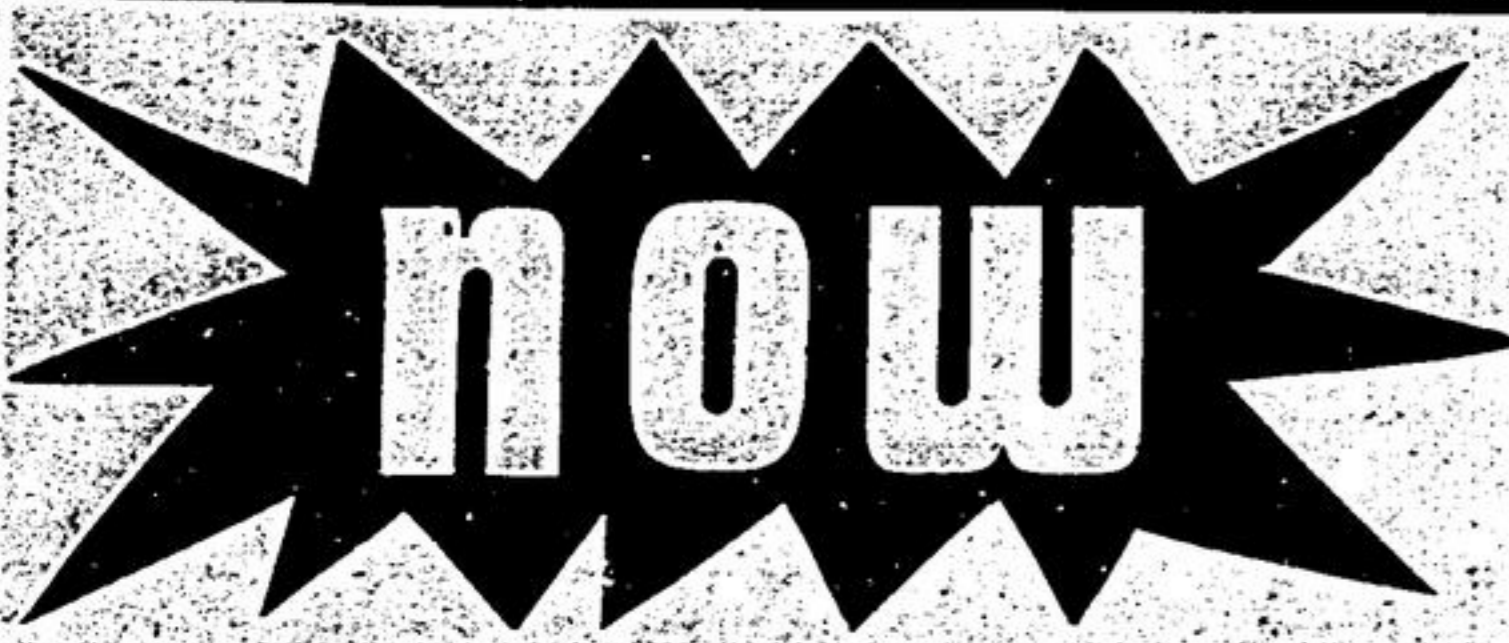
Senior's week Strawberry fest at town park today

Summer playgrounds - arts classes held at Ballantrae, Vandorf

STOUFFVILLE — This summer playgrounds will be operated at Ballantrae Community Centre Park and Vandorf's Whitechurch Community Park.

The summer programs, sponsored by the Whitechurch-Stouffville Recreation Committee, will run from July 5 to August 27, from 9:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., five days a week.

Joyce Watson, who has been running the craft program at the old library building in Stouffville, will give lessons in macramé, drawing, weaving, paper mache art, Indian crafts, batik and other crafts.

Registration fee is \$2 per child per month, up to a maximum charge of \$5 per family for each month and registration date for the first session is July 5, and August 2 for the last session.

Playgrounds are open to all residents of the municipality and registration forms are available at the municipal offices, Whitechurch Highlands Public School and Vandorf General Store.

Ballantrae playground will be conducted by Joanne Wedley and Holly Leitch while Trish Edwards and Kathy Wood will supervise the Vandorf operation.

Parents who intend on sending their children are encouraged to save milk and egg cartons, shells, styrofoam, string, newspapers, old nail polish, binder twine, wool, straws, nylons, detergent bottles, brown paper, cardboard rolls, buttons, elastics, cans, coat hangers, wallpaper scraps, empty spoons and meat trays. These objects will be used for arts and crafts.
