Holidays are highlighted with trips by Gormley residents

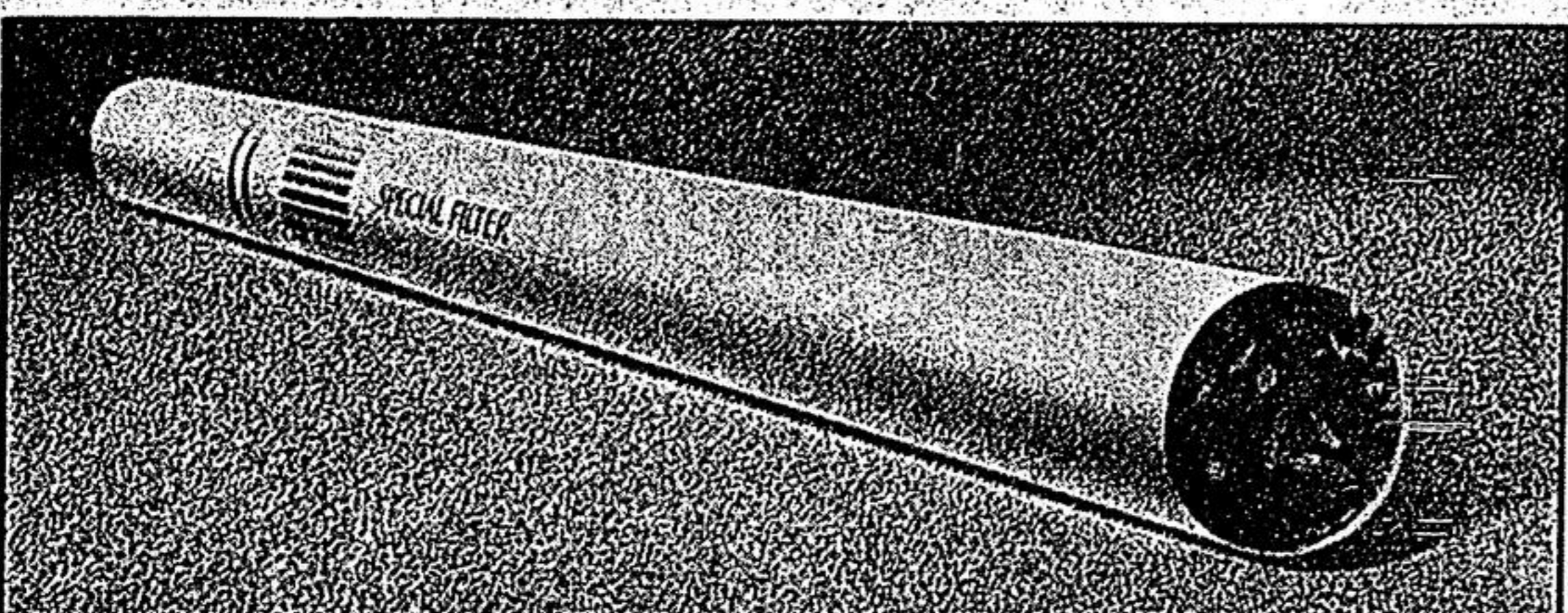
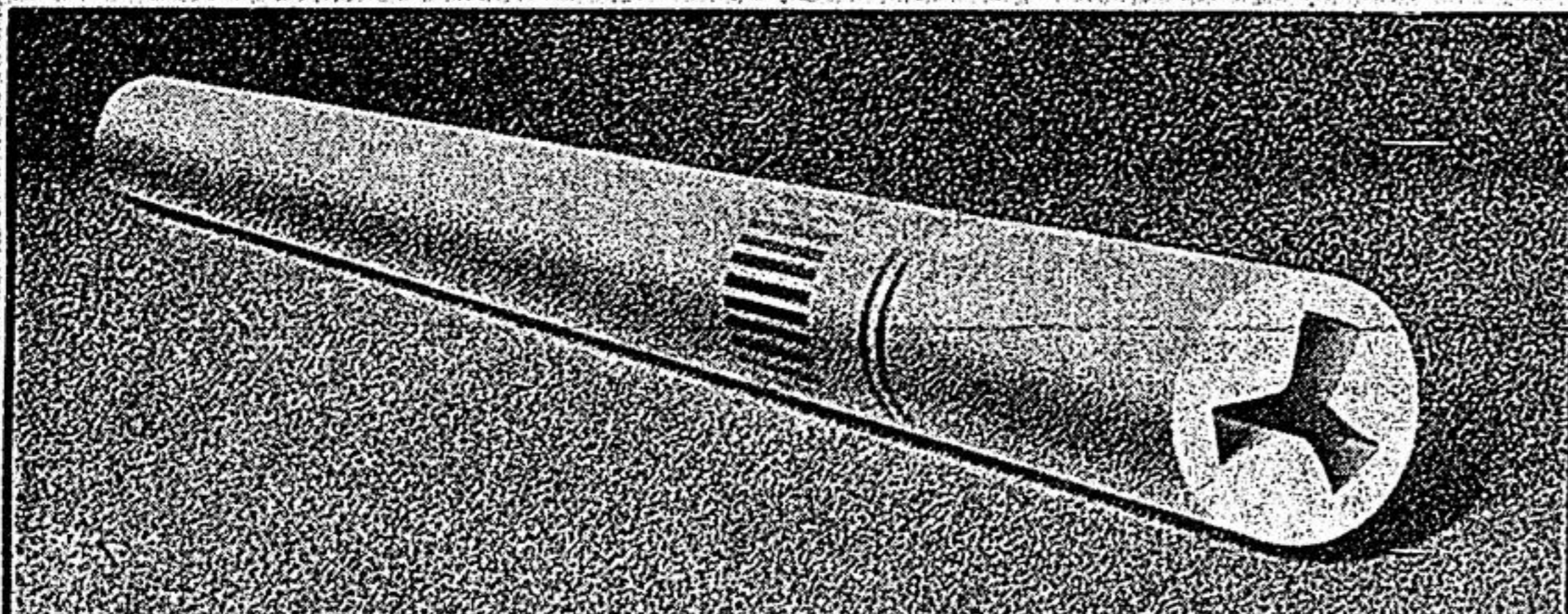

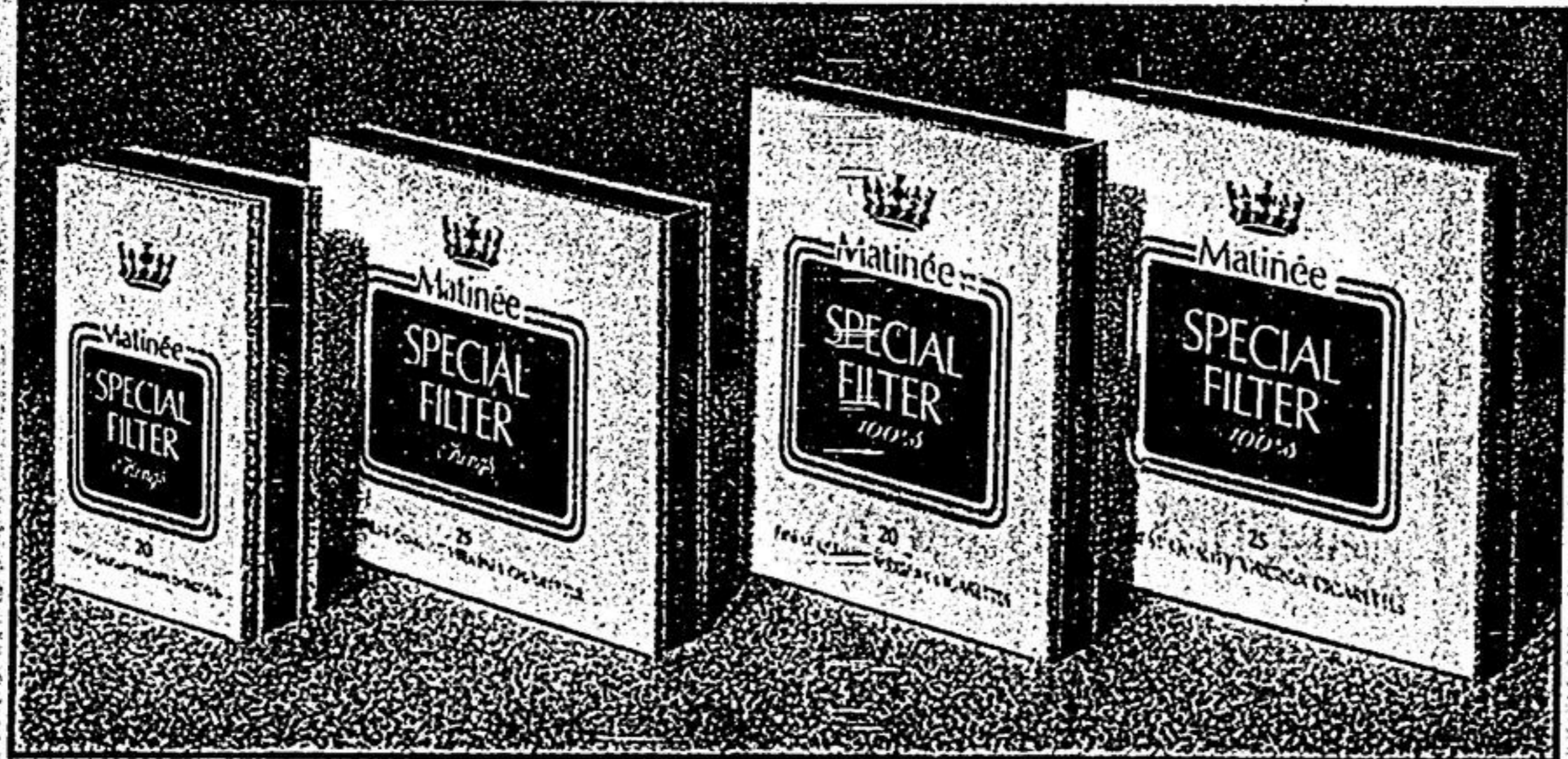
