## Midgets to play tie-breaker game

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville all-star midget softball team has been in a three-way tie in their league.

Two other teams had an identical 7-4 record, as of Tuesday: East Gwillimbury and Thornhill. Stouffville was to take on Bradford Tuesday in a league contest.

Tonight at the town park, the midgets will play Claremont, beginning at 8:30 p.m.

## Kids plus horses adds up to fun at camp

STOUFFVILLE — One hundred and thirty children and sixty horses add up to a great time...at least that is the opinion of campers and counsellors at Horse Lovers Day Camp.

Heidi and Udo Hochgeschurz started the camp ten years ago with a handful of enthusiastic Saturday pupils from their riding school.

"We double the number of campers every year," said Heidi, who still drives one of the big yellow Horse Lovers buses to and from the city each day.

Children from 7-16 are ferried to the camp from all over York Region as well as Toronto. The one thing they have in common is a love of horses. This is fortunate since each camper gets six riding lessons a day, as well as instruction in horse care.

Campers learn how to saddle up, what to feed a horse, horse grooming and exercising, even how to bathe a horse. Even the youngest become quite proficient after several weeks, though they practise on ponies.

For their lessons the children are divided into groups according to riding ability.

One of the favorite exercises is the longe line lesson, which involves all sorts of bareback stunts while the instructor holds the line.

Children attempt to ride the horse backwards, lie down, lean forward and sideways, and even mount and dismount while the horse is moving. This gives the young rider confidence, as well as improving his balance.

In the group lesson all are mounted on their own steed and learn "how to steer the horse" as one young pupil put it. The more advanced riders go on to jumping and trail rides.

With all the instruction, children learn to ride very quickly, but the main aim is not to make expert riders of the children. "We want the children to enjoy their holidays," said Heidi. From all appearances, they certainly do.

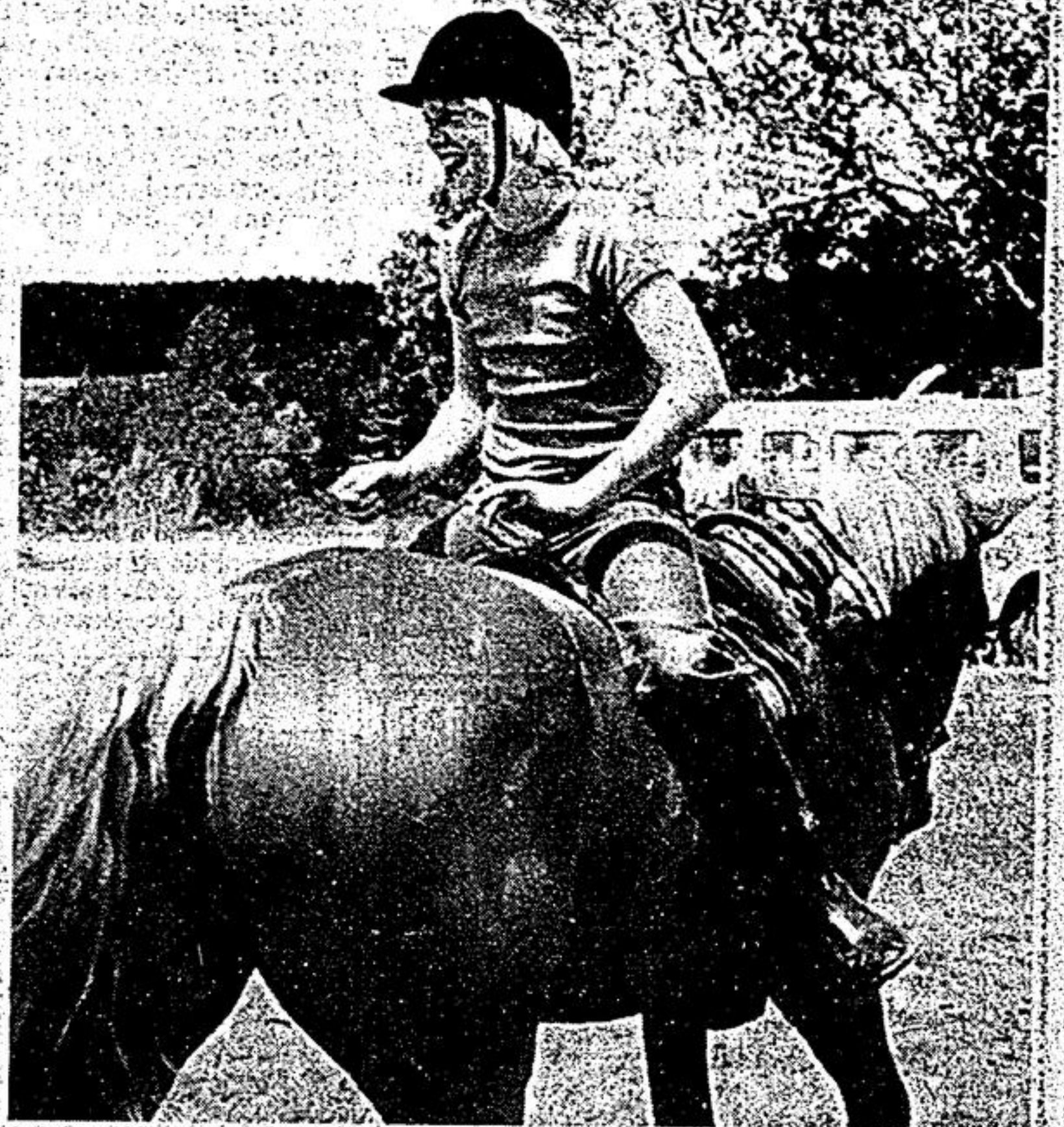
