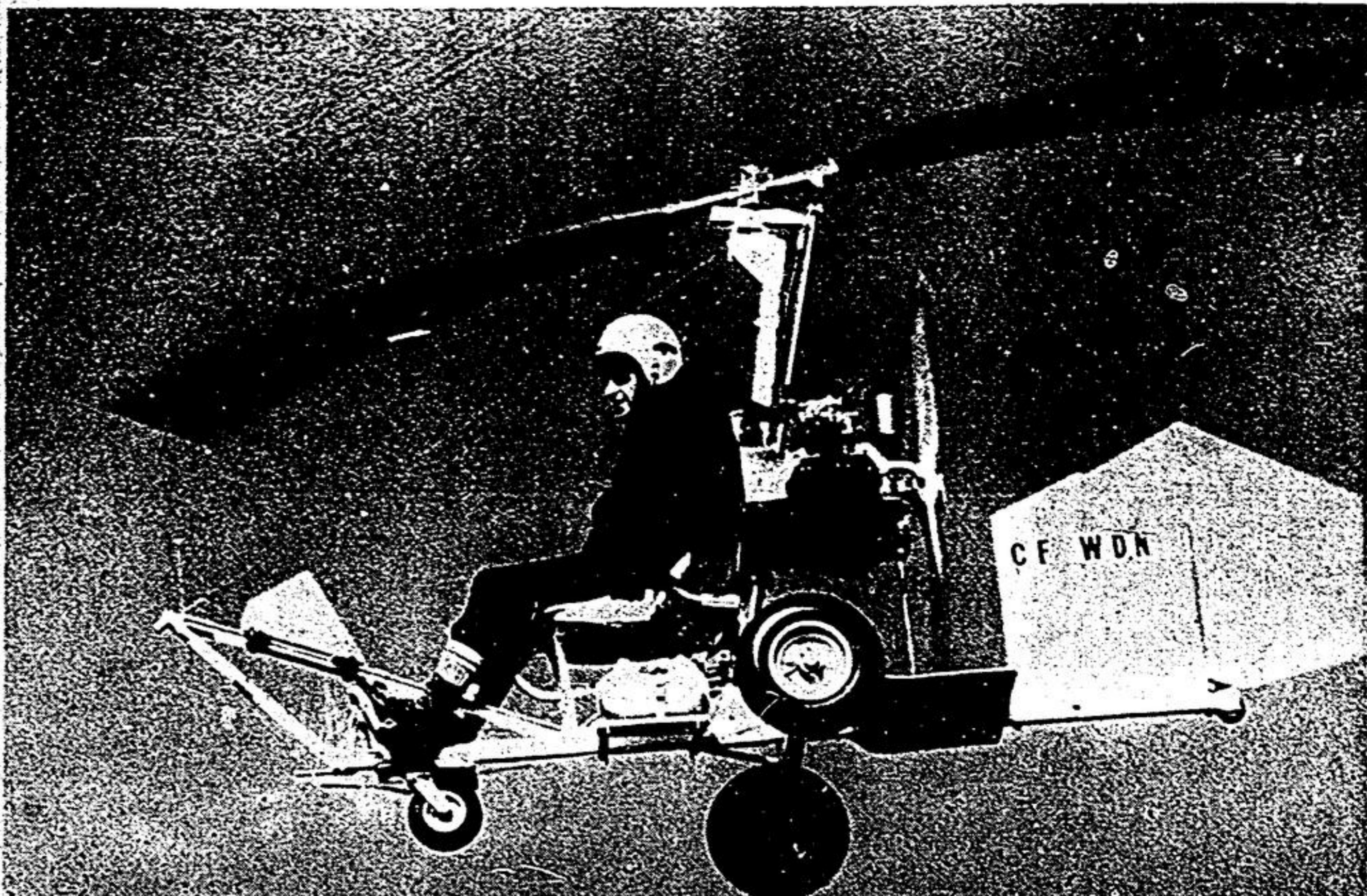
Disagreement over building permit

STOUFFVILLE — Planning Board agreed recently to try mediating in a dispute between neighbours.

Crisis group is suggested

STOUFFVILLE — A resident of this area has suggested formation of a crisis intervention

group. Norman Ross, who came to this area a few months ago from England, wrote to council asking that a centre be established in the old Post

Office. Mr. Ross has worked with "Samaritan", a volunteer organization in England which provides a "safety valve" for potential suicides. He suggested a similar centre be established in town, if and when the town rents the old building for community use.

Teenager convicted

NEWMARKET — A 17 year old Gormley youth was fined a total of \$200 following his conviction in Newmarket Court recently on charges of prowling and possession of a stolen wallet.

Donald Joseph Gordon of R. R. 1, Gormley was charged by

York Regional Police last March 13 after he was caught by police hiding in the bushes at a house on Kitimat Drive in Aurora. He was also found to be in possession of a wallet owned by an Ontario Hospital attendant Donald J. Keating, who told the court his wallet had been missing.

Conviction of speeding on Main St.

NEWMARKET — A 17 year old Stouffville youth was convicted on a charge of dangerous driving recently in Newmarket Court after pleading not guilty to the charge, laid by York Regional Police last April 23.

Daniel Wagg was charged in April after York Regional Police followed his speeding car at speeds up to 80 miles an hour along Stouffville's Main St.

When Police caught up to the vehicle it had stopped, and Wagg was slumped across the front of the seat. Wagg told the court he had increased his speed when he realized police were following him, and said he was scared. He denied travelling over 55 miles per hour and admitted he had three beers in the car.
