New principal believes in a "happy school"

STOUFFVILLE - "Openness with limits" seems to be the philosophy of Robert Girard as he takes over the position of principal at St. Mark's Separate School this fall.

Mr. Girard, an 11-year veteran teacher and principal, told The Tribune that "my basic philosophy is that if you have a happy school, learning takes place best."

He said he's had some background in "open" education and thinks of himself as "more open than a closed person."

However, Mr. Girard doesn't approve of school being "a free-for-all in which the kids run around and do what they want... You have to have structure in there so the student feels comfortable in what the limits are."

His background includes nine years as a teacher in Windsor, one year at Our Lady Help of Christians school in

Newmarket as vice principal and a year as principal of Our Lady of Good Council in Sharon.

Mr. Girard graduated from Windsor Teacher's College and earned a B.A. at the University of Windsor and a Master of Education degree at the University of Virginia.

As principal, he hopes to emphasize scholarship, service to one another and God, and sports." The latter, he feels, is "a key in keeping discipline...They're putting energy into constructive areas."


