consistent with normal procedures.

The reconstruction, to be 90 per cent subsidized by the province, will include a new widened road bed, improved drainage and turning lanes for the intersection of Highway 47 and Main St.

A turning lane will be provided to allow traffic coming from the north to turn west onto Main St. and a second lane will be for westbound cars to turn north at the intersection.

Plans call for a sidewalk on the west side of the road to extend as far as South St. and for a curb to be installed as far as North St.

## New Markham Fairgrounds work to begin

MARKHAM — Work is expected to begin on the new Markham Fair site within a week or so. Fair board members are hoping the forms will be up for the new buildings before frost sets in.

The Stouffville firm of Michael Wade Construction was awarded the contract for five of the buildings, to be erected at the new fairgrounds at 18th Avenue and the 7th Concession.
