

York policemen commended pulled youth from blazing car

NEWMARKET — Two York Regional Detectives and a police constable have received commendations from the York Regional Police Commission for their quick thinking and actions taken without any regard for their personal safety, which probably saved the life of a Rexdale youth.

Detectives Barry Delaney and Lowell McClenney and constable William Miller were recommended for the honour by Regional Police Chief Bruce Crawford.

A wanted vehicle which had been eluding a York Regional Police

officer became involved in a collision with another vehicle on Steeles Ave. west of Keele St.

According to Chief Crawford's report, Rajan's vehicle ran into the back of the car driven by John Dawson of Rexdale, causing his car to flip end over end onto the roof. It caught fire as the vehicle came to rest on the median strip.

Constable Miller arrived on the scene seconds after the vehicle broke into flames, and immediately smashed the window on the driver's side and attempted to remove Mr. Dawson. Detectives Delaney and McClenney, who also had

arrived to assist were able to remove the semi-conscious man through the broken window and carry him to safety before the car exploded and erupted into an inferno.

Mr. Dawson suffered cuts to his head requiring 30 stitches to close.

The driver of the wanted car, Puthinarambal Thomas Rajan of Downsview, was later charged with criminal negligence and driving while prohibited, last July 19, and convicted by County Court Judge E. Wren. Rajan was sentenced to six months definite on the criminal negligence charge and an additional three months consecutive on the other. The court also ordered a two-year term of probation following the completion of sentence.

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

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Lemonville organ

Loving restoration leads to planned written history

LEMONVILLE

The old pump organ that for many years saw service in the Lemonville Church has found a new home.

Many residents were sad to see the more than 100 year old instrument go, when it was auctioned off last year, and expressed an interest in the restorations its new

owner, Jim Hayward was planning.

They wouldn't recognize the instrument today. The old finish, almost black with age, has been lovingly stripped and the solid walnut instrument now gleams in a satiny woodtone that brings out the natural grain. The pedals have not been forgotten either. Mr. Hayward's sister Lois,

painstakingly made new authentic needlepoint coverings for them while Mr. Hayward restored the badly pitted brasswork.

However, most of the restoration was done on the inside. "I learned an awful lot about organs," said Mr. Hayward, who used an old volume published around the turn of the century to help him with the instrument repairs.

When he came to the feels, he was surprised to find evidence that they had never been touched before. "Curled up inside were old bugs, or rather, their skeletons," said Mr. Hayward.

After spending more than 200 hours on restoring the 1868 Dominion organ, Mr. Hayward has become so intrigued with it he plans to write a history of its past.


