James Johnstone mourned

Golf course architect dies

One of the original owners and founders of Sleepy Hollow Golf & Country Club, Stouffville, James (Jim) Johnstone, passed away on Sept. 1st at Scarborough General Hospital. Mr. Johnstone's passing came on the occasion of his 79th birthday.

Deceased was a native of Scotland and had been living retired in Markham for some years. He was a professional golfer but was most widely known as a golf course architect, having designed courses in various locations around the world. One of his finest efforts was the layout of the Box Grove course for Nelson Morgan Davis. This was a private layout, built exclusively

for Mr. Davis and reputed to be one of the finest anywhere on the continent. Mr. Davis was the sole member and employed Mr. Johnstone as his professional. The course has been more recently sold to I.B.M. Mr. Johnstone enjoyed a wide circle of

golfing friends and his broad Scottish accent was a joy to hear. He was an ardent supporter of his native Scotland and enjoyed numerous trips "back home".

Mrs. Johnstone, the former Isabelle Denholm, predeceased her husband several years ago. Surviving are two sons, Ian and Jim, daughter-in-law Audrey and grand-children Jimmy, Janice and Terri.

The funeral service was conducted from the Trull Funeral Home, Yonge St. on Saturday. Interment will be in Dunbar, Scotland.

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville Figure Skating Club executive has decided to completely revamp its junior skating classes in an effort to relieve congestion in the lower badge levels.

In past years the skaters were divided with ability, i.e. badge levels, being the main criteria. This resulted in a mammoth junior division and caused much discouragement among both skaters and pros since there simply wasn't room to advance each child into a suitable group.

All that has changed this year. Jean Barclay, a professional who was widely respected for her abilities before retiring from the club, has decided to come back and work with the junior skaters and the junior section has been divided into several groups.

There will now be six different classes of skaters, all grouped according to age and badge levels. They include Preschoolers (those under 5), Morning Glories (a ladies group), Juveniles (5-7 year olds), who will work up to and including badge 7, Juniors, (children 8-10) who have achieved badge 7 and will work up to badge 9, Intermediates, (11-12 year olds) who have badge 9, and Seniors, (13 and up) who have achieved their preliminary figure.
