

More open houses set by information committee on centre

UXBRIDGE — An information program by the Uxbridge and Canadian Penitentiary Services Information committee is entering a second phase.

The program, designed to inform residents about the effects of locating a federal penitentiary reception centre in the township, will include a second round of open houses in the municipality as well as a second brochure.

Furthermore, more trips to Warkworth and Kingston penitentiaries will be sponsored by the committee in the future.

The open houses are to be held October 18, 19, and 20 in Uxbridge, Zephyr and Goodwood. As for the brochures, they will be in a question and answer format and are meant to answer the questions raised most

frequently about the proposed centre. A brochure will be sent to each household in the township as well as being distributed in public places, according to U.C.I.C. member Diane Kerr.

An oral report on the results of the second series is to be presented October 29, with a written report due by November 15.

Earlier responses showed a third of residents who answered to be in favor of the centre and two-thirds opposed.

Uxbridge arena could still operate, with renovations

UXBRIDGE — There is a possibility that Uxbridge arena will be able to operate this winter despite its having been declared unsafe by the Ministry of Labour, but council are keeping their options open.

They are proceeding with plans for renovation and reconstruction of the building until they get definite word from the ministry.

Originally, the ministry had declared the Uxbridge arena, along with over 180 others located throughout Ontario, unsafe, and demanded that it be repaired or demolished and rebuilt to withstand greater stress loads. However, the ministry has had a change of heart and has ruled that some arenas

may stay open for the winter season if snow loads were carefully monitored and the arenas cleared of people if loads exceeded ministry standards.

This would allow the communities to continue with their winter hockey programs and follow through with repairs or rebuilding in the summer.

Communities will have to raise 25 per cent

of the money for renovations with the rest coming from Wintario Grants, and the community recreation funds budget. This assistance plan will avoid municipal tax hikes to pay for arena repairs.

A pledge by a responsible community organization to the local council to raise their share of the money is sufficient proof of local support, the ministry said.

"It doesn't say in the site plan agreement to save the trees," said Mr. Ratcliff. "It will be a complete new landscaping job."

The mayor said that the berming and changes of elevation made it impossible to save the trees. Other areas are paved over with parking lots and sidewalks, in the site plans.

Two die near Goodwood as youths race automobiles

GOODWOOD — Two people are dead and four others are in serious condition after two cars racing abreast on the 2nd concession collided head-on with a third car at the crest of a hill.

Durham Regional Police allege that two cars driven by Bryan Etter, 16, of Agincourt and Scott Anthony, 17, of Agincourt, were northbound about three-quarters of a mile north of Highway 47 about 7:45 Sunday evening when they collided with a southbound car driven by Thomas Scott, 32, of Toronto.

Mr. Scott and Mr. Anthony were pronounced dead at the scene of the accident. Mr. Scott's wife and two young daughters are described as being in serious but stable condition.

A one year old daughter was removed to Sick Children's Hospital, a three year old is at Uxbridge Cottage Hospital and Mrs. Scott was taken to Scarborough Centenary Hospital.

The car driven by Mr. Anthony belonged to an unidentified passenger who is also in Uxbridge Hospital. Mr. Etter and two passengers in his vehicle were not seriously injured.

Mr. Etter has been charged with criminal negligence causing death and with racing.

Damage to the three cars is estimated at between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

Stouffville Fire Department were called out to the scene and were given the unpleasant task of cutting Mr. Scott's body from the wreckage.

"It was sure a mess alright," commented

Fire Chief Walt Smith. The department was called out to another accident on the 2nd of Uxbridge, Friday night, when a dune buggy went off the road near Glasgow and sheared off a telephone pole. Mr. Smith said the passengers were badly shaken but appeared to be not seriously injured.

Because she feels she is not well known in the rural areas of the municipality Mrs. Joice said she will begin to campaign very soon.

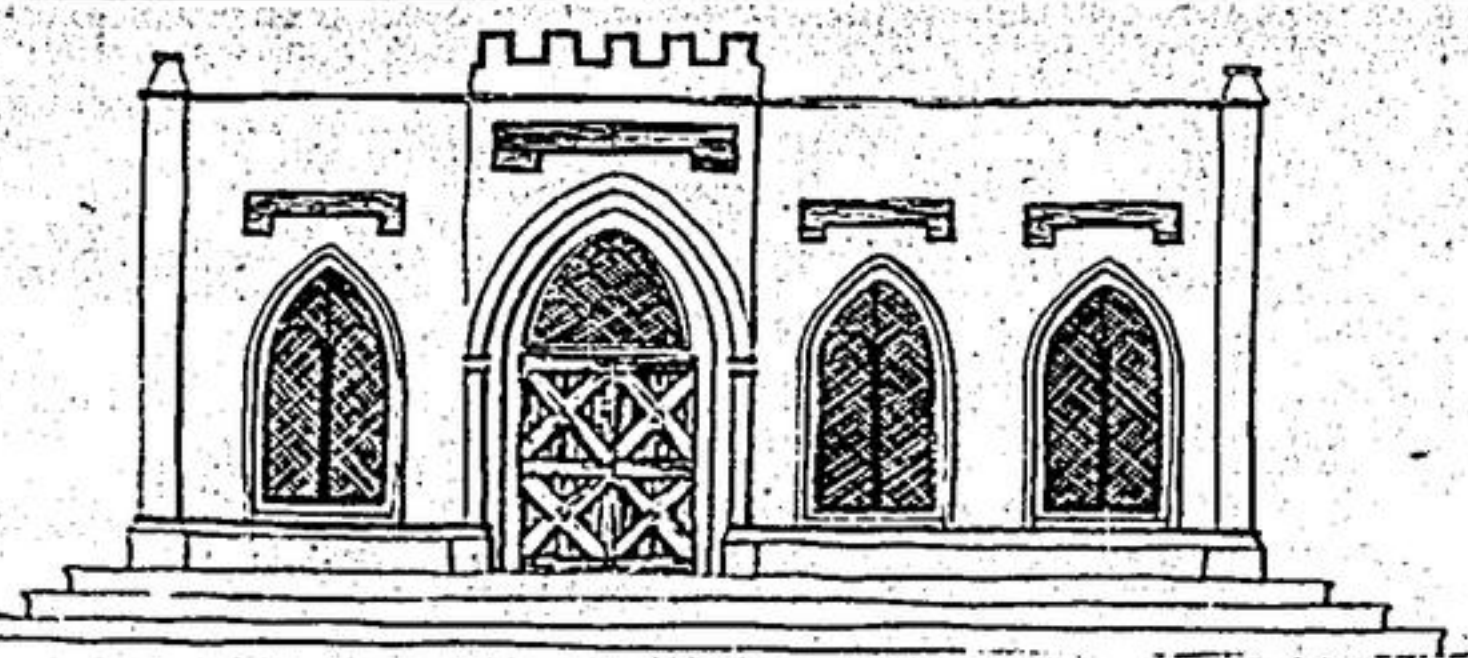
"She said that as a woman she will have to work twice as hard "because people don't expect you to do very well." Mrs. Joice said she "very
