Town planner not to be used by developer

STOUFFVILLE — Retaining the same planning consultant to work for both the town and a developer was disapproved by planning board recently.

The decision was with regard to a demographic and economic survey that is to be carried out by Harding Gate In-

vestments, Ltd. to gauge the effect of a proposed plaza in the east end of Stouffville.

The developer informed the board in a letter that they intended to engage MacroPlan, Ltd. of Toronto. That planning firm is run by town planner Max Sherman.

Councillor Cathy Joice said that while she was sure Mr. Sherman would do a top-notch job for both the town and the developer, she felt it should be an independent, outside concern doing it.

In the view of Councillor Merlyn Baker, there is no reason MacroPlan Ltd. would not prepare the report in the best interests of the town. He expressed the view that if the town adopts the policy of not having the same consultant for planning, then we should carry it through for engineering too.

Board rescinds lake boat motion

STOUFFVILLE — A planning committee motion, expressing the intention to limit the size of boat motors on Musselman's Lake was rescinded by planning board recently.

A delegation of lake residents recently had asked council to allow the residents themselves to police the lake, since they felt the problem of powerful boats on the lake had been solved this summer.

Planning board chairman Eldred King

commented that "we haven't made a decision on anything" and that "the only thing to change is ownership and that could change tomorrow."

Access to the lake has been controlled this summer through the purchase of the Shalimar property, which had been used in the past for launching boats from outside the community.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said that the "owners of the property are going to retain it; it's in very strong hands."

MacroPlan Ltd. had drawn up the terms of reference for the study, which was indicated by York Region planners to be necessary before plans for the plaza could proceed.

"We shouldn't encourage applicants to use our consultants," Councillor Art Starr summarized.

York Regional Police reports

Thieves net \$3,344 at lake home break-in

Items worth a total of \$3,344 were stolen from a Musselman's Lake home in a recent break-in. York Regional Police reported that between August 31 and September 11, the home of Gail Round of Valley Road was entered through the front door by smashing a window pane, and TV sets, stereo equipment and other articles taken.

Markham Chrysler entered

An electric portable calculator and a tape recorder worth a total of \$338 were stolen from the office area of Markham Chrysler Dodge, 220 Wellington Way, the night of September 14. The premises were entered through a rear garage window and the office area ransacked.

Cash stolen

Cash worth \$446, plus other coins, was stolen from a cedar chest in the home of Cecil Stickwood, R.R. 2, Stouffville on September 18. Culprits forced a window and went directly to the chest, pryed off a padlock and removed 10 twenty-dollar bills, 21 one-dollar bills and 60 twenty-five cent pieces (1967 RCMP issue). No other part of the house was touched.

Barn break-in

A barn used for manufacturing pellets at Philmar Lumber Ltd., Highway 48, Markham, was entered last week and two air nail guns and rubber hoses worth \$974, stolen. Thieves got in by removing a sheet of plywood which covered a stair well.

Youth charged

Brian Hughes, 19, of Rose Avenue, Stouffville

was arrested last week in connection with a break-in at the Whitechurch-Stouffville municipal offices January 11. Police had taken fingerprints in the building. Minor damage to two offices had taken place.

Expensive vadais

Vandals at Progress Supply Ltd., Kennedy Road, Unionville smashed typewriters and calculators worth \$800 the night of September 17. Premises were entered by cutting the screen on a window and forcing a window. Nothing was taken from the building.

Threatened

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of an R.R.1, Claremont man, age 29, who is charged with threatening Paul Fray, Steeles Ave., Markham, with a short-barrel rifle. Police said Mr. Fray was approached by the accused in a pick-up truck while in the Dominion Plaza parking lot on Highway 7. The accused pointed a rifle at Mr. Fray's head, said he was going to kill him, then drove away, police said.

Don Sim will not run

MARKHAM — Markham's Don Sim won't be back for a third term on the York Region public school board. In an interview from his home here recently, the Toronto lawyer confirmed that he won't seek re-election in December. "I'm very discouraged about the whole thing," he said, "and I haven't got the time for the position." During his four years on the school board, Mr. Sim served one year as chairman.
