Members vote on all-star fee

STOUFFVILLE — The matter of an extra \$5 fee for all-star players caused wide-spread dissent at a recent W-S M.H.A. meeting when the roughly 50 persons present couldn't agree. Four different votes had to be called before the matter was settled, and the extra \$5 was decided on.
 Practice time for the all-stars was another sore point, there just isn't enough available. President John Wilson attributes the shortage to the growth in girl's hockey.
 Women's vote
 At the general meeting last May the constitution was changed to allow women to vote, but only one lone female, the reporter from the Tribune, showed up, to the disappointment of the hockey executive. They would like more women to show an interest in the hockey association.
 200 lost sweaters
 Keeping the teams equipped is an expensive proposition and the \$70,000 budget will only stretch so far, so the matter of replacing 200 lost sweaters over the winter for the house league alone was no laughing matter. Also, treasurer Ed Grimshaw pointed out that if six replacement sweaters were sent to be re-created, the company always charged for 12, the minimum order.
 Face masks
 Although full wire face masks are not compulsory, Ed Grimshaw highly recommends a mask for all players. According to him, far too many children get hit in the eye — an injury easily prevented with masks.

Repair of courts

STOUFFVILLE — Council will wait until spring to call for an estimate on the cost of resurfacing the tennis courts at Rupert Avenue Park.
 Council, which passed a Public Works Committee recommendation, were dealing with a Lion's Club letter about the matter. The club, who had donated the courts to the town, expressed concern about courts' deterioration.
 Councillor Cathy Joyce said the Public Works Committee had recommended waiting because no money is available in this year's recreation budget to do the work.
