A public meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to discuss the following proposed Official Plan Amendment, whereby it is the intent of Council to:

"Consider proposed amendment no. 12 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from 'Rural' to 'Estate Residential' on part of LOT 17, CONCESSION 4. The subject site consisting of approximately 57 acres is located on the south side of Slater Road east of the Canadian National Railways line. The proposed amendment results from an application by M. G. Slater Ltd. which proposes a 22 lot 'estate residential' development."
