At present, salaries of the 50 volunteers in Claremont and Brougham range from \$4 to \$8. Full-time firefighters make \$7.17 to \$11.26 per hour.

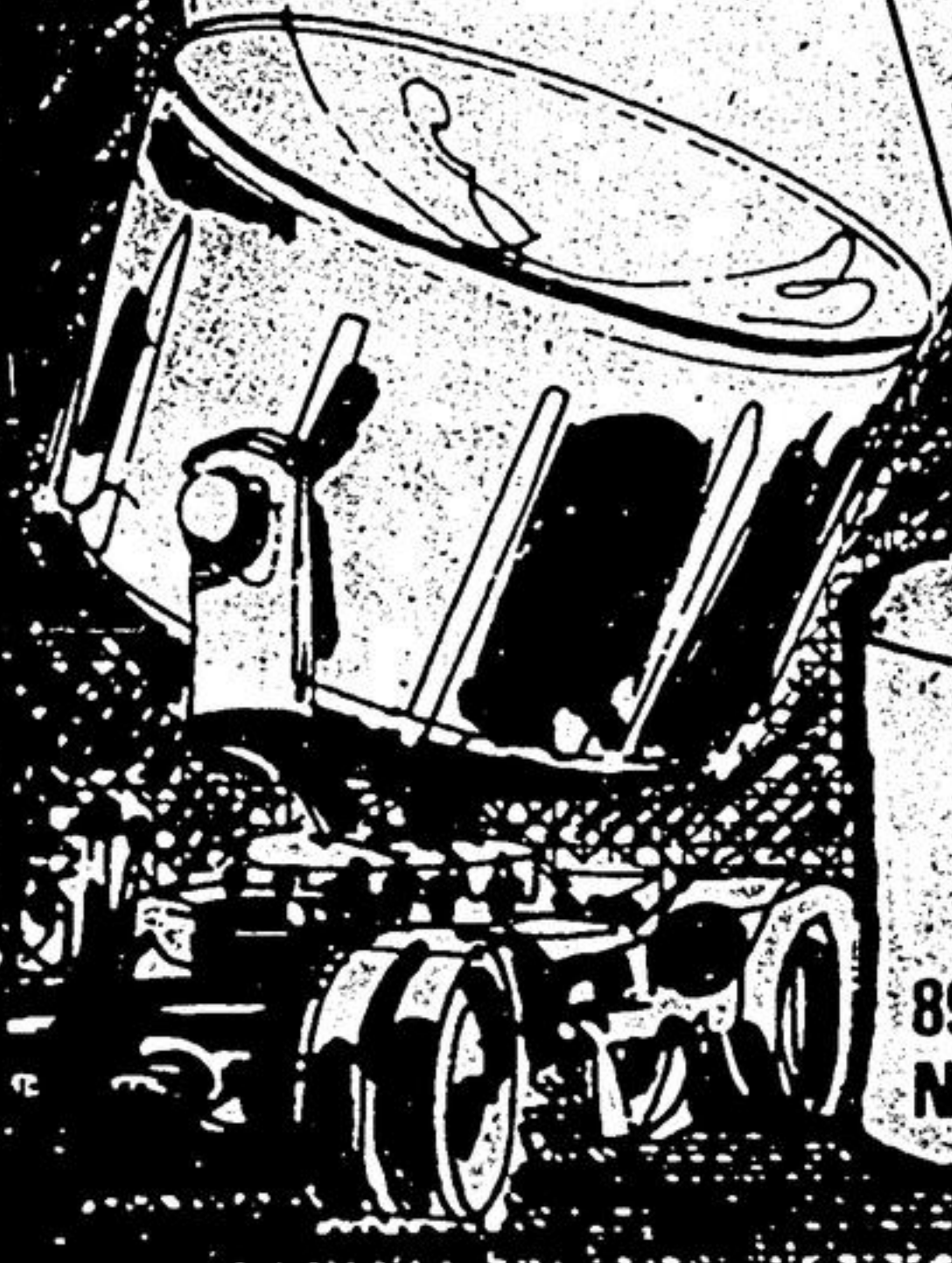
