

## Use station as centre for seniors, says Rehill

EUGENE, OREGON — Although temporarily residing on the western fringe of the continent, Jim Rehill is maintaining an active interest in Stouffville.

Mr. Rehill, on sabbatical from the phys. ed. department at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School recently sent The Tribune some helpful advice and information on how to put Stouffville's old post office to use.

He had read in The

Tribune of the town renting the building from the federal public works department, and commented, "I think that the old post office could be a senior drop-in centre."

Mr. Rehill is using his year to study setting up programs in Ontario schools on the subject of aging. He has been active in making gerontology (the study of aging) an integral part of SDS health classes.

"In my travels," said Mr. Rehill, "I have seen and visited various types of senior centres. Some were relatively new, beautiful and expensive, while others have been held in old, inexpensive buildings. But all had one thing in common: active seniors with a new purpose in life, and because of this, they are happy."

He wrote that "retired people should not and do not want to be entertained. They certainly need the assistance of the community, financial and administrative, but by and large, they themselves should be actively involved."

An example of a highly successful seniors' centre is the Celeste Campbell Senior Community Center in Eugene.

A brochure on the centre sent by Mr. Rehill says attendance averages over 800 a week there, and that volunteer instructors, hostesses and other helpers contribute close to 15,000 man-hours weekly.

The city of Eugene and other public agencies picked up the tab on purchasing and maintaining the structure.

Seniors, at the centre, come for a variety of reasons: they make friends, pass time playing pool or cards, study foreign languages or other subjects, learn or employ existing skills in arts and crafts, perform community services, take charter bus trips or attend job search classes.

In turn, the seniors have performed numerous services for the community-at-large, including sewing items for those in need, building therapy equipment for the county health department, fixing up old toys for children at Christmas time, and so on.

## Austrian minister became a Christian in this country

ALTONA — The new pastor of Altona Missionary Church, Volker Klaue, comes here via Austria.

He and his wife, the former Mae Summerfeldt of Stouffville, have spent the last two years working with a home Bible study group in that country.

Mr. Klaue, a student pastor, was born in Austria and raised in West Germany, but emigrated to Canada in 1960. He is a 1969

graduate of Ontario Bible College.

After his father died in 1960, Mr. Klaue said "for a long time I had no certainty about God or life after death. I was interested in all kinds of philosophies, but I did not find any certainty."

He became a Christian after coming to Canada, when a German friend of his in Toronto invited him to evangelistic meetings being held at Ontario Bible College.

"It was then my life took a different direction," recounts Mr. Klaue. "I recognized I was a sinner and needed God to bring purpose, order and direction into my life."

Among other jobs he held in Toronto during the 1960's were garbage collector, hospital orderly, bank computer operator and clerk.

Later, as part of Operation Mobilization, an evangelistic organization, Mr. Klaue spent two summers working in his native Austria and a half year in Turkey.

Mr. Klaue points out that both the church building and the parsonage of the church in Altona are owned by the

federal government, as it is located on land slated for the now-defunct Pickering airport. The church recently passed its 101st anniversary.

He said the church has sponsored some neighborhood coffee hours to help long-time residents of the community get to know newcomers, and vice-versa.

Regarding the people of the congregation, Mr. Klaue remarked, "I am pleased with the way people in Altona have opened up their hearts to us."
