Mayor's report

Station available to any municipality

STOUFFVILLE — Canadian National Railways will make the old station in Stouffville available to any other municipality that might want it, if Whitchurch-Stouffville doesn't, according to Mayor Gordon Ratcliff.

In an interview Friday, he told The Tribune that after contacting CN by phone, a letter was received stating that the building would not be removed from the premises immediately, so council will have a chance to change their minds if they so desire.

Council earlier had turned down a suggestion by CN to make moving

the historic building a centennial project, and instead asked the company to either improve or remove the building by 1977.

Question: What effect on the financing of the new library will the sale of the old building have?

"The financing of the new library is really complete as far as the town is concerned," said the mayor. "The library board won't have to ask the town to finance it at all now."

The town had agreed to guarantee \$35,000 towards the sale of the old library building so that construction on the new one could get underway. The sale price on the old building was \$39,900.

Question: What ever happened to the trial transit service from Musselman's Lake that was to be instituted this fall?

Mr. Ratcliff said that a further survey was taken, the results of which were "not too hopeful." People were asked to definitely indicate whether or not they would use the service, and not many questionnaires were returned.

"It was quite questionable as to whether there is enough there to start this taxi service at the present time," he said.

Question: What was your reaction to the public meetings on the interim official plan for Whitchurch-Stouffville?

The meetings were "very well attended" and the plan was "very well received," Mr. Ratcliff said. "It was good to see the turn-out. It encouraged council to see the interest the residents have in the future of their municipality."

He added, however, that "we would have expected more local participation in Stouffville, with Dulverton coming up."

While there were few objections to the aspects of the plan dealing with the rural areas, the mayor said he expects the big objections will be raised Nov. 2 when developers are invited to register complaints before planning board.

Planning board will consider objections raised to see if changes should be made in the plan before it is sent for approval by the province.
