

Mr. Phillips, proprietor of the Ringwood general store, is shown here standing in front of the structure which is estimated to be between 125 and 150 years old. Saturday the contents of the store will be sold at auction and Mr. Phillips will move into Stouffville with his son. He has been at the present location for 21 years and before that he was at the Dominion store in Stouffville for 27 years. Mr. Phillips told The Tribune he went into the

grocery trade at the age of 13. The type of operation Mr. Phillips has run is fading out nowadays but he still has a lot of customers who rely on him for telephone orders. He said he doesn't really know what he will do with his time as he has worked seven day weeks for years. He will miss his customers he said. Mr. Phillips was widowed seven years ago and four of his five children are living out west. The old store will be rented temporarily but it is slated for demolition.

Jack Anderson seeks second term

PICKERING — Incumbent Ward 3 councillor, Jack Anderson, has announced that he will definitely run for a second term as regional representative.

"I feel capable of representing both the rural and urban areas,"

John Paxton

said Mr. Anderson. He explained that with the change of election boundaries a lot of urban area will now be included in Ward 3.

One of the major issues confronting the town is the North Pickering Development.

In Ward 3

Mr. Paxton says he will strive for more effective budgeting for improved road maintenance within the municipality, equalization of the regional tax assessment and preservation of local autonomy over recreational facilities within the ward.

He supports Durham Region's proposal to the Ontario Municipal Board that local control should be retained over gravel.

Regarding the gravel question, he sees "an urgent need for amended and new bylaws satisfactory to all affected."

Mr. Paxton also intends to recommend to the regional planning committee that more housing be permitted in the ward.

He said he is pleased council has provided an opportunity for a public

vote on the issue. If elected, Mr. Paxton said he will be bound by the decision made by the electorate.

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Eleanor Todd, the present councillor, has not yet announced whether or not she will seek re-election.

Fuzz Buster

theft reported

THORNHILL — York Regional Police may have the feeling they're working against themselves in the case of a theft reported recently.

Murray Harstman of Sea Island Path, Thornhill, told police his locked car was entered the night of Oct. 23, and his "Fuzz Buster," was stolen. The device is used for warning the driver if a police radar trap is coming up.

Value of the device was set at \$150.

Originally the province was to have complete charge of the project.

Another project of major concern is the Pickering town centre area. Studies have been completed, land has been designated, and council is now working on a secondary plan for a basic downtown in Pickering.

"We are trying to have a mixed area — residential, commercial, senior citizen's homes, and an abundance of parkland," said the councillor. "I think it'll work."

Mr. Anderson would also like to see through the construction of the town recreation complex. The facilities, which will be centrally located to serve northern areas such as Claremont, as well as the town centre, are badly needed, in Anderson's estimation.

"I would like to stay around until the first stage is completed," said the councillor.

Mr. Anderson, who among other things, has been acting mayor, chairman of the planning board, and head of the regional works committee, has served on council for five years. He is so far unopposed in his ward.

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People upset with Co-op operation

CRAZEMONT — The operation of a noisy corn dryer at the Claremont Co-op has posed quite a problem for Pickering council lately.

Residents living near the mill were most unhappy about the 24 hour a day racket and called police to close the operation down on the grounds that the mill was breaking a town bylaw. The bylaw states that all noisy machinery must be shut down between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

The farmers, who were most anxious to get their feed corn dried before it could rot, were understandably upset and appealed to the provincial minister of agriculture, Bill Newman, for help.

He contacted the mayor and a special meeting was held and after some deliberation, council decided to amend the previous bylaw to permit the mill to operate longer if a state of emergency was declared. It was then moved that an emergency existed. As a result the corn-drying operation will proceed from 6 a.m. until midnight.

"You have to look at both sides," commented councillor Jack Anderson. He says that while no one is particularly happy with this solution, it appears to be the only workable alternative that is fair to both parties.

To prevent similar situations in future, the Co-op has agreed to build a noise buffer wall which will reduce the racket somewhat.

Footings for this structure have already been poured.

Hi Lawrie, councillor in Ward 6, added a little fuel to the flame this week, by announcing his candidacy for the Region.


Others already declared are incumbent, Alma Walker and ex-regional councillor, Ron Moran. There are two to be elected.
