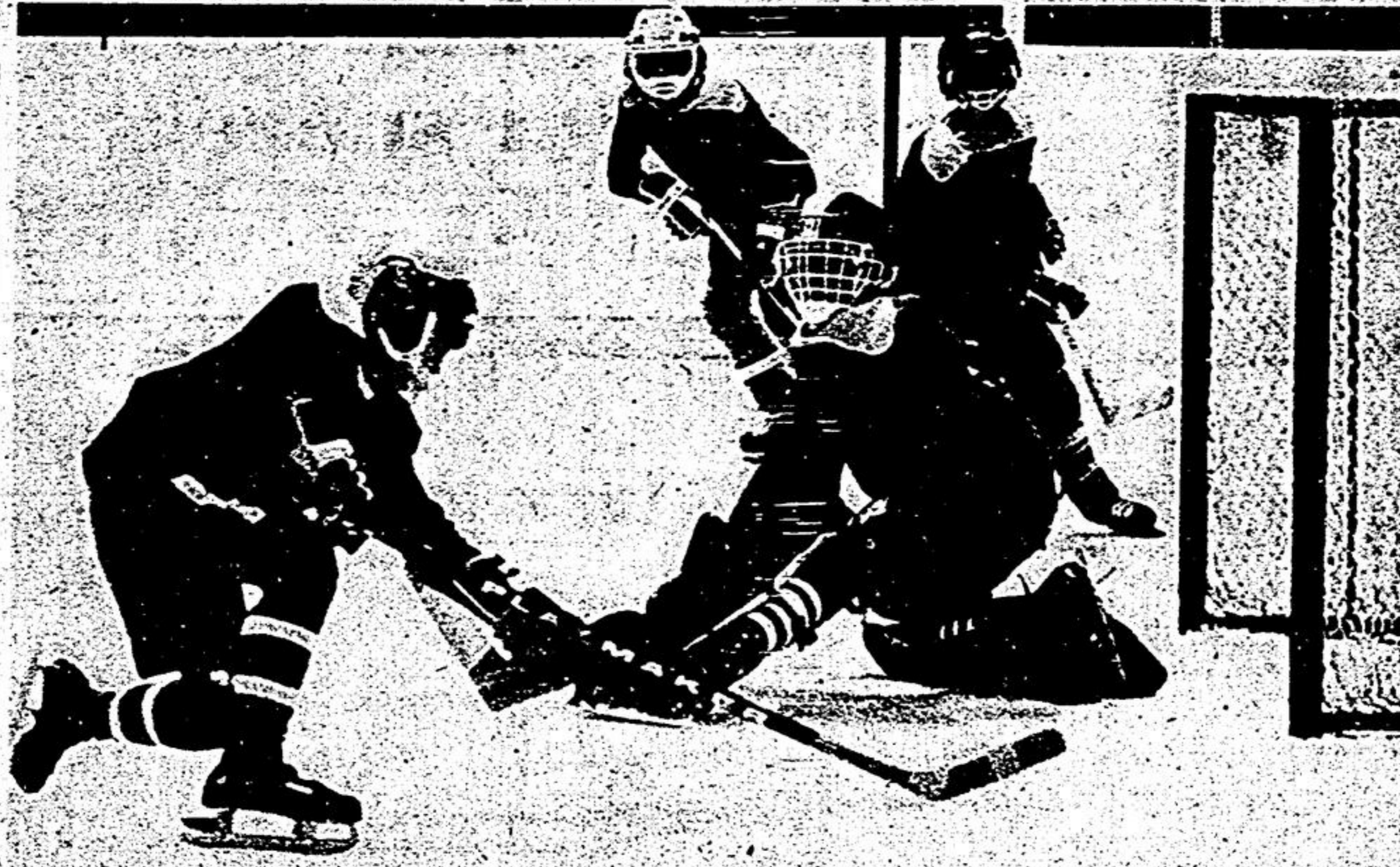

Real Estate Clippers clout Cobourg Cougars

STOUFFVILLE — The Ken May Clippers celebrated Halloween Saturday night by convincingly squashing the Cobourg Cougars 5-3.

The win avenged the 9-6 loss at the hands of the same Cobourg club one week ago Monday night and evened the Clippers season won-lost record at three.

Kevin Barrick led the May attack with two goals, and singles came off the sticks of Ted Assinck, Bill Meakes, and Perry Brown.

Randy Fife managed to beat Clipper goalie Rick Marshman twice and Morris Petherick tallied the third Cobourg goal.

Marshman stopped 46 Cougar shots, while his teammates managed only 30 shots on Cobourg's Ren Fowler.

Barrick opened the Clipper scoring late in the first period when Chris Clarridge set him up while Cobourg's Jeff Timlin was off four rousing.

Assinck's goal followed three minutes later, this time on a pass from Barrick. Bill Meakes scored an unassisted goal with just three seconds left in the period to put the Clippers up by three.

Midway through the second frame, Jeff Roy and Doug Taylor set up Perry Brown for Stouffville's fourth goal. Two minutes later, when the Barrick-Assinck combination struck again, the Clippers seemed headed for a rout and a shutout for goalie Rick Marshman, but a pass from the corner by Cobourg's Randy Fife hit Marshman's skate and went into the net.

This short-handed goal sparked a Cobourg comeback.

With 23 seconds remaining in the period, Fife tallied again as Clipper defenceman Chris Clarridge was serving a minor penalty for interference.

The third period saw only one goal scored, that by Cougar Morris Petherick, and the Clippers held on to win 5-3.

The game was reasonably free of incidents, except for a last minute, fight between Clarridge and Cobourg's Ken Stevenson.
