GOODWOOD — For the third consecutive year, Ivan Norton of R.R. 1, Goodwood, is world champion in the rye class of field crop competition at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

Quite a number of other local competitors did well in the judging as well.

In the A.O.V. carrot category Mr. Norton was third, while his wife Lillie placed second. He also was third in the Nantes carrot class.

A brother-sister team from Goodwood grabbed six awards in onion classes. Mark Hendy was first in yellow cooking

type onions while Laura Hendy was fourth. Laura was first and Mark fourth in red onions, and Laura picked up second in large Spanish onions, and second in white globe. Mark was named reserve champion in the onion category.

Laura also won a third in a pumpkin class.

Jean Smith of Gormley won three firsts, one second, one third and two fourths in squash and one pumpkin class, while Celeste Smalley and William J. McNelly both of Mt. Albert, each took home nine awards in vegetable classes.

Ivan and Lillie Norton won first and second, respectively in sebage potato, with Albert Hockley of Claremont, third, and Mark Hendy of Goodwood, fifth. Mevin Baker of Stouffville was third in the Avon or Irish potato class. Lillie Norton was second. In other potato classes, Frank Hendy of Goodwood got a fourth, Melvin Baker a third and Ivan Norton a fifth.

Albert Hockley of Claremont captured first in the sebage seed potato class.

The commercial feature display exhibit for potatoes saw Ivan Norton, first; Albert Hockley, second; Lillie Norton, third; Frank Hendy fourth and Melvin Baker, sixth.

In six-rowed barley competition, a former local man, Stanley Feasby now of Port Perry, was first, with Grant Davidson of Stouffville, sixth. Mr. Davidson won two 10th places and an eighth in hay categories.

In 4-H classifications, Carolyn Davidson, RR-1, Stouffville was first in the

wheat, any variety, class. Grant was first in oats, any variety and fourth in barley, six rowed. Carolyn was third in barley, two-rowed.

Another 4-H winner was Murray Norton, of Goodwood who was first in potato, any variety, class.

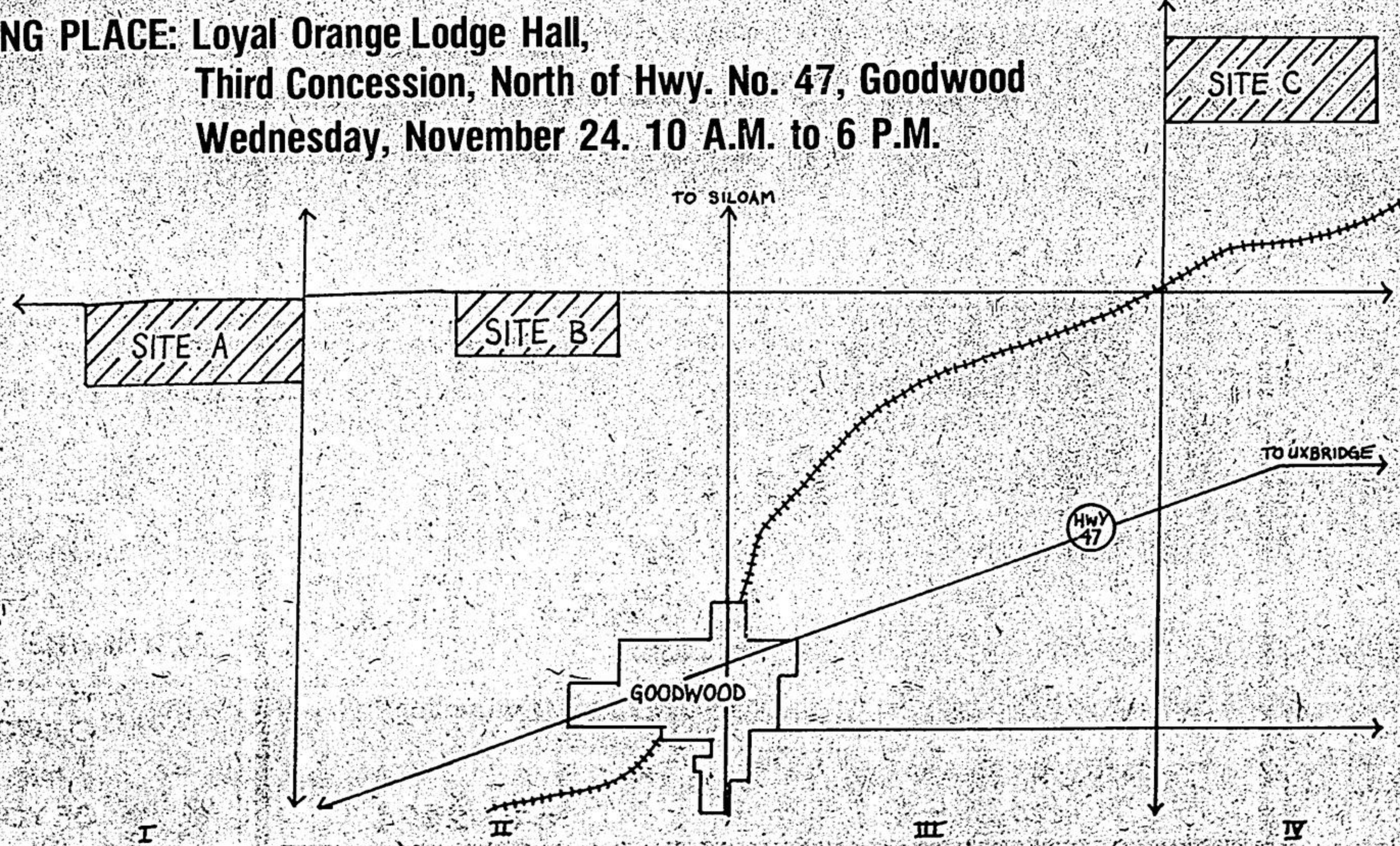
