Stouffville could be second Yorkville-antique shop owner

STOUFFVILLE — Gay Robertson, owner and proprietor of the recently opened Thorntree Antiques on Main St. W., envisions Stouffville as becoming an elegant shopping area similar to Yorkville Ave. in Toronto.

Mrs. Robertson, who opened the shop in Stouffville to complement her business as a planning consultant and interior decorator, feels that all that is needed to make the village boom as a fashionable shopping area is more parking and a bypass for Highway 47.

It would be no problem, she is convinced, to restore many of the older commercial buildings to their original condition. With Stouffville's beautiful old homes and with the addition of planters and benches, she feels it is quite a practical idea.

Thorntree Antiques specializes in Canadiana, all pieces at least 100 years old and primitive accessories such as kitchen utensils.

When questioned by The Tribune as to why she

opened an antique store she replied, "I had to go into antiques because people demanded it."

The store is an outgrowth of her planning business, where she mainly specializes in antique decorating. Although not an architect, Mrs. Robertson does draw up plans for extensions or renovations to offices and homes.

She designed the extension to the Meharg home on Main St. and has decorated board rooms across Canada and into the United States.

"That's the interesting part of the business," she said, "not just sitting in the shop waiting for people to come in."

She estimates that over 60 percent of her business comes from customers she has dealt

with previously in her planning business but she admits to being pleasantly surprised at the number of customers who have come in off the street.

She feels owning her own shop will improve the service she offers in planning and interior decorating. She says she doesn't really do straight interior decorating work but will help people choose wallpaper and like that.

Her work experience, she says, has been invaluable to her in the planning business. She worked for a time as a dress designer and apprenticed at an interior decorating shop in her home town of Montreal.

The secret of successful decorating, according to Mrs. Robertson, is knowing how to put

things together and especially how to scale the furniture to the room.

When drawing plans for a room she will specify the window hangings and the size and location of the furniture and then leave it to the customer to go ahead and purchase the furniture if they so desire.

"That way they know exactly what the room is going to look like and they won't spend money on things that won't fit in," she explained.

Her husband, Don Robertson, an Executive Vice-President with the firm of Heggie Advertising does her refinishing for her and will be more active in the business following his retirement.

The Robertsons have been Stouffville residents for the past 10 years.

THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK

WARDEN AVENUE (Regional Road No. 65)
and STOUFFVILLE ROAD (Regional Road No. 14)

THE COUNCIL OF THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:

1. The elimination of the jog in Warden Avenue (Regional Road No. 65) at its intersection with Stouffville Road (Regional Road No. 14) in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville by realigning and widening Warden Avenue from its westerly intersection with Stouffville Road to a point approximately 5,000 feet north thereof to a basic width of 100 feet, with additional widenings at cuts, fills and the intersection with Stouffville Road; the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading, gravelling and paving thereof to provide a basic two lane roadway with additional turning lanes at the intersection with Stouffville Road, the construction of a cul-de-sac on Warden Avenue immediately north of its easterly intersection with Stouffville Road and the construction of culverts, drainage works and all other related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.
2. The widening of Stouffville Road (Regional Road No. 14) in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville from approximately 1200 feet west of, to approximately 1500 feet east of, its intersection with Warden Avenue to a basic width of 100 feet with additional widenings at cuts, fills and the intersection with Warden Avenue; the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading, gravelling and paving thereof to provide a basic two lane roadway with additional turning lanes at the intersection with Warden Avenue and the construction of culverts, drainage works and all other related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.

The Engineering Committee of the Regional Council will, at its meeting to be held at 2:00 p.m. on the 7th day of December, 1976, at the Engineering Building on the west side of Woodbine Avenue one and one-quarter miles north of the Aurora Side Road, hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard.
