## New Clipper line combo aids in win

produced almost instant results. Sparked by the speedy Brown, the threesome netted seven of the Clipper's 12 weekend goals. The Ken

May squad beat Port Hope 7-3 Saturday night after losing 7-5 to Lindsay the previous day.

The story in Lindsay was once again defence, as the May crew blew a 4-1 lead in losing their fourth consecutive game on the road. Bob Craig had given Lindsay an early lead, but two goals by Doug Taylor and singles by Peter Fitzpatrick and Andy Leitch shot the Clippers ahead. Lindsay stormed back to tie the score in the second period before Perry Brown netted what proved to be the last May goal.

The Clippers wilted in the third period and were outscored 3-0. Both Damon Bennett, and Wayne Norton missed the contest, and the May defence was noticeably affected as goaltender Rick Marshman got little support.

Saturday night was a different story as the night belonged to Perry Brown and goaltender Jack Holder. Brown set up four goals and put on as fine an individual performance as has been seen at the local arena in many years. He skated miles and sparked his teammates with superb

forechecking and 'gutsy' aggressive play. Holder, on the other hand, was brilliant.

The Panthers fired 60 shots at the diminutive puckstopper, but beat him only three times. Holder attributed his success to the play of his defence.

"I told my defence that they'd have to open up so I could see the outside shots," said Jack, "and that's exactly what they did. We played our best defensive game of the season tonight."

Doug Taylor opened the scoring for the Clippers on a perfect pass from 'Sparkplug' Brown. Seconds later, Brown put him in the clear again, only to see Doug rattle one off the post. Dan Dunn evened the count at one and Panther Terry Watts put the Port Hope club ahead a minute later. Kevin Barrick pulled the Clippers even on a pass from Bill Meakes and Ted Assinck, and two minutes later the Taylor-Brown act put the May club ahead to stay.

Early in the second frame, Assinck scored from Barrick and Meakes and Peter Fitzpatrick followed three minutes later from Andy Leitch

and Geoff Roy. Earl Johns pulled the Panthers to within two, and when Damon Bennett was sent off for five minutes for high sticking, Johns and his Panthers went to work.

Only expert goaltending by Holder, and key defensive play by Wayne Norton and Chris Clarridge stemmed the tide. From there on the Clippers never looked back.

Scott Connor scored midway through the third period from Clarridge and Brown, and again, with 36 seconds left, from Taylor and winger Brown.

The win moved the Clippers into a third-place tie with Lindsay, while Bowmanville continues to lead the loop ahead of Port Hope.

The Clippers meet Frankfurt this Saturday night at 8 p.m. before embarking on a strenuous road schedule that sees them in Cobourg on Monday, Uxbridge on Tuesday, and Port Perry a week Sunday.

They have yet to win on the road, but if Saturday night was any indication, their drought away from home is about to come to an end.

## Sousses downed by three points

Then, when Fletcher deliberately missed the foul shot, Button controlled the rebound, passed to Connell, who passed to Beauchamp, who sank the tying basket just as time elapsed.

In the ensuing overtime period, the Generals controlled the ball for the entire two minutes, then won the game with three consecutive foul shots.

Next game for the Sousses is Monday, Nov. 22, at the Uxbridge gym, at 7 p.m. Spectators are more than welcome and admission is free.
