Diary from honeymoon 60 years ago indicates cost was less than \$20

You think it can't be done? Ask Mr. Roy Brillinger about that! Maybe not today, but he did it! Life-time residents of Gormley, Mr. and Mrs. Brillinger will be celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary this month. Recently, Mrs. Brillinger showed her diary recording their honeymoon trip. They left by train from Toronto and travelled to Stevensville, Ontario, a stop not usually observed by the line, but that evening it stopped for the wedding couple and they were met by an uncle. Stevensville became their headquarters and from there they visited and stayed with many relatives and friends.

They attended a series of evangelistic services, Bible conference and a council meeting at the Bertie Brethren in Christ Church. They also went to Buffalo for several days with relatives and friends there and had their wedding portrait taken. Yes, she took the wedding gown on the honeymoon!

Another visit of incidental interest included their several days at Wainfleet, where on one of their visits, Mrs. Brillinger has recorded, "after supper we played

hide and go 'heap' with the two children". Numbers of years later, one of these children became their son-in-law! They returned to Gormley via train and apparently had some money left over from the twenty dollars, following a four week trip which included fare, meals, photography etc.

Mr. Brillinger has farmed Lot 1, Cons. 3 Whitechurch since 1913 when his parents moved there from Bethesda. Mr. and Mrs. Peter Brillinger resided in the large two family house until their death in 1955. Lot 35, Cons. 4 Markham was added to the farm later. The 100 year old farm house met with misfortune in August 1967 when it was gutted by fire. However, many of the dishes, furniture and treasures of the family were recovered, including the memories and gifts of their fiftieth anniversary just eight months earlier. They later purchased the house at the end of the lane of the homestead, where they are presently residing. The Brillingers have done mixed farming, but potatoes have always been an annual crop. Mr. Brillinger still keeps active in working with the potatoes and some tractor work. Mrs. Brillinger also remains active and will challenge many in a game of Scrabble.

The family has set up a "B. V. H. Fund", (Bringing Velma Home) for the anniversary celebrations. Since Velma was not home for the 50th anniversary, the family has arranged to bring her home for this special and happy occasion. She will be arriving at the Toronto International Airport on Friday, 3, remaining in Canada to Jan. 14. An open house is planned for Mr. and Mrs. Brillinger on Monday, Dec. 27 from 2-4 p.m. and 7-9 p.m. at the Fellowship Hall of the Heise Hill Brethren in Christ Church. A family dinner is being planned for the same evening. Friends and neighbours are invited to stop by at the open house tea. Please no gifts.
