May Clippers break losing streak

STOUFFVILLE — The Ken May Clippers finally broke out of their slump on the road. They beat Cobourg 8-1 a week ago Monday, Uxbridge 5-4 the following Tuesday, and tied Port Perry 6-6 on Sunday. The night before, the Real Estate crew put on the lack-lustre performance in losing 6-3 to the visiting Lindsay club. The Clippers ended their four game losing streak away from home by destroying the Cougars, last year's league finalists. Doug Taylor led the way with three goals, with singles coming from Ted Assinck, Bill Meakes, Henry Vernoy, Kevin Barrick, and Craig Waite. Doug Choiniere was the lone Cougar to beat Rick Marshman.

The team managed only three goals in a very dull performance from which Lindsay emerged with a 6-3 win. Doug Taylor, Craig Waite, and Damon Bennett scored for the May squad. Lindsay made the best of Stouffville penalties, scoring four times with a man advantage, and once while they themselves were one man short. Jack Holder stopped 47 Lindsay shots in the Stouffville cage. The game marked the second time in one week that the Clippers have lost a player to suspension for taking a very childish cheap shot at an opponent. Last Saturday, Perry Brown received a match major penalty for spitting at an opponent; he was suspended for three games. On Tuesday night, Peter Fitzpatrick received the same match major for butt-ending an opponent, and although the length of his suspension is not known, his loss will again disrupt the Clipper lineup. The Sunday night

encounter was a seesaw battle finally decided when Kevin Barrick netted his third goal of the evening to tie the score with just 1:27 left to play. Other Clipper scorers were Scott Connor, Bill Meakes and Doug Taylor. Captain Ted Assinck picked up four assists, while Perry Brown and Bill Meakes each gathered a pair. Doug Christie was Port Perry's hero as he scored four of the 'Flamingoes' six goals. Rick Marshman tended the Clipper goal. One player who has

improved immensely for the Clippers is Geoff Roy. He picked up five assists against Cobourg and scored the winner against Uxbridge. Roy has also sparkled defensively for the May team. In these last four games, Geoff spent a total of four minutes in the penalty box, quite a reversal from days gone by. Known best as "Gimmy", Roy leads his Clipper teammates against Frankford this Saturday at 8 p.m. and then to Port Perry Sunday night for an en-

counter with the Flamingoes.
