## New Claremont minister settles in after being "on the road" a while

CLAREMONT — From a job that required driving, during one three-week period, 2,700 miles, Rev. Lorne Smith will be settling down somewhat as he takes over the pastorate next month of the Claremont Baptist Church.

His last position was with the Canadian Missions department of

the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, and involved "being on the road" much of the time.

Mr. Smith and his wife have already moved into their home in Claremont and are getting to know congregational members, who he describes as "very friendly, warm people."

A special service for the installation of Mr. Smith into the Claremont pastorate is scheduled for February.

"I'm reaching retirement age, but I anticipate being here for a few years, if God gives me the health," Mr. Smith told The Tribune.

He was influenced to go into the ministry, he said, by two laymen — one of them being his father. He graduated from McMaster University, Divinity College, and served as pastor in Coaticook, Quebec; Niagara Falls; Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan; Brandon, Manitoba; London, Ontario; and Kitchener before serving with the missions branch.

"If I was starting again, I'd take the same

route," said the minister. "The church is most relevant to today's society. I've been in it long enough to see both sides of the question."

On the lighter side, Mr. Smith is looking forward while here to inspiring some other clergy in the area to join him in some sessions of curling, an activity he "picked up out west," he said.
