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Uxbridge council rejects bylaw supporting HUDAC

UXBRIDGE — A motion by Sandy Ewen that "house builders in Uxbridge be required to show proof of HUDAC registration before being issued building permits was referred to the township's planning and development committee.

Ewen had pointed out that provincial law, effective Jan. 1, required all builders to be registered. He felt it would be wise for Uxbridge to make this provision to ensure that builders would not be liable to a \$20,000 provincial fine for non-compliance, which would perhaps leave the builder bankrupt and saddle Uxbridge with a lot of unfinished houses.

"We would only be making the builders aware of their obligations," Mr. Ewen said.

Councillor Gary Harroma disagreed. "I want to make sure that this does not affect the little fellow wanting to build his own house," he explained, and moved the matter be referred to committee.

HUDAC stands for the Housing Urban Development Association of Canada, a non-profit association of home builders which works under the ministry of corporate and consumer relations. The association issues a warranty to consumers that the home will be built to Ontario Building Code Standards, that the builder will be responsible for defects for the first year, and that HUDAC will accept responsibility for any major structural defects for the next four years.

Fines for code violations range from \$2,000 for individuals to \$25,000 for a company.

STOUFFVILLE — One of the first jobs of the new Uxbridge council tackled last week was the appointment of six committees to deal with the business of the township for the next two years.

All seven council members will serve on the planning and development committee because, as Mayor Davie views it, future planning within the township is crucial.

Mr. Davie has also decided to serve on each and every other committee, as has the councillor from Goodwood, John Paxton.

Paxton is also chairman of the Public Protection committee and vice-chairman of Recreation.

Other committee heads are: Mac Meyers, Works and Roads; Gary Herrema, Planning and Development; Sandy Ewen, Property and Parks; and Alan Wells, Recreation.
