TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE PUBLIC NOTICE DOGS

By-law 75-94 as amended requires the owner of a dog to obtain a tag by FEBRUARY 15TH each year.

Tags available at Municipal Office, 19 Civic Ave., Stouffville

The By-law prohibits dogs running at large. A dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found in any place other than the premises of the owner of the dog and under the control of any person.

Where only one dog is kept the fee shall be male or female \$10.00 neutered male or spayed female 6.00

For each additional dog male, female, neutered male or spayed female \$12.00

The fees referred to in this section are determined by the number of dogs per household.

For the purpose of this section the Town may require written proof from the owner that a female dog has been spayed or a male dog neutered.

PENALTIES

Maximum penalties \$50.00 plus cost for

— failure to obtain tag (on conviction)

— dog running at large (on conviction)

Pound fees \$10.00 plus \$2.50 per day

Violation Tag (dog at large) identity known but not impounded \$10.00
