Metered water coming to Stouffville will replace flat rate billing system

STOUFFVILLE — The town's flat rate water system will eventually be replaced by meters, Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said in a recent interview.

Commenting on the meters, Mr. Ratcliff pointed out that the meter system is the fairest way to charge for water, but "there are old residences in town that don't have meters so we won't be changing until the whole town is on them."

The town has one of the lowest water rates in the region, Mr. Ratcliff said, although he did admit that if the town went to meters there would be more water saved.

"We would conserve a lot more water if the homes went on meters, but it is quite expensive to change. It will come, but not for a few years yet," he said.

When asked about the unfairness of a industry using large amounts of water and paying the same rate as a home user does, Mr. Ratcliff stated that the situation cannot occur. "Every industry or commercial operation that uses water is on meters and they pay for what they use. It is only the private homes that are on flat rates; so we don't get an industry using 10 times more water but paying the same rate as a residence. There are even differences in residential homes, such as if someone owns a swimming pool they will pay \$11 above the flat rate. So there is really no unfair situation arising from the flat rate."

Mr. Ratcliff also warned the town to be prepared to conserve as much water as they can this summer. He stated that there is a by-law to regulate the amount of water used in the summer and he feels it will be rigidly enforced because of the increasing water costs. "There will be no wasting of water this summer," he said.

When asked if he thought it possible to direct some funds to buy new playground equipment in the park, Mr. Ratcliff said the budget will be reviewed later this month and at the present time he really didn't know.

"There is the possibility of new lights

going into the park and we will also be considering the proposal to prepare a soccer field, but I don't know how the budget looks yet.

"If the playground equipment is considered to be a hazard then we should install new equipment, it would be looked after. I'm sure it won't cost too much money either."

Another area discussed was the lack of fire alarms at the Ballantyne Community Centre and whether alarms would be installed.

Mr. Ratcliff pointed out that a resolution has been passed to put in the alarm system, along with a smoke detector. He said it is required under the new building code and that it should have been in the original contract. "The architect should have seen that the alarm system was put in," he said.

One area that Mr. Ratcliff and the majority of council do not agree on is the Lehman's Pond issue. Council has voted to have the pond filled in on the ground it will be a threat to youngsters attending the school that will be built north of Manitoba St., within the Dulverton subdivision.

Mr. Ratcliff stated that he is in favour of leaving the pond in its natural state, and expressed hope that council will change its mind on the matter.

"We are expecting a conservation study of the area in a short while and if it favors leaving the

pond in I hope there will be a change from council. Fortunately, there doesn't have to be a fast decision on the matter, as it would take at least six months to change the zoning bylaw. I hope in that time council will change its mind on the matter."


recently mainly supported by grants from York Region, but these have run out.

"They're getting by on a shoe-string," said one source. If no alternate source of funding is found and the Region will not change its mind, the centre may have to close its doors.

There was a backlog of more than fifty cases when the money ran out and presently volunteers have stepped in the breach and are counselling some of them.

Local churches and service clubs contribute to the operating costs, but is barely enough to cover overhead. Unlike the Stouffville branch, Markham has to pay rent for its quarters.

Charles Creamer, the Chairman of the Board of Directors, has not thrown in the towel, however. "We're going after the region again this year," he said, "and if we get a grant for this year, we should get funds by June or July." He explained that application to the region had already been made. "We're hopeful," he concluded.
