YRP get brand-new uniforms

Commissioner H.H. Graham of the Ontario Provincial Police is pleased to announce that during April the public will begin to see members of the OPP in a new all-season uniform. The new jacket will replace the present tunic worn by the OPP and most other Police forces in Canada.

The jacket is designed for greater flexibility. It features a pleated back, giving the officer a greater ease of movement. The Sam Browne belt will be worn under the jacket rather than on top, with areas cut away at the bottom of either side for the officer's gun holster and handcuff pouch.

The jacket will be worn for work purposes only with the present tunic being retained for formal occasions.
