York-Durham gets funds

TORONTO — Agriculture and Food Minister Bill Newman has announced an additional allocation of \$36,000 to be spent on the drainage projects in the Riding of Durham-York.

The municipalities of Georgina, Stouffville, Newcastle and Uxbridge will each receive \$9,000 in increased allocations following the minister's earlier announcement of a \$2 million extra allocation to more than 100 municipalities across the province.

Newman said his ministry will advise the four municipalities by letter of their increased allocations. He explained that proper field drainage can increase crop yields more than any other single method.

Previous title drainage funds were allocated to Brock, \$53,200; Newcastle, \$13,200; Pickering, \$10,000; Scogog, \$35,100; Uxbridge, \$10,000; Georgina, \$10,000; East Gwillimbury, \$10,000; and Stouffville, \$10,000.
