

New wing built

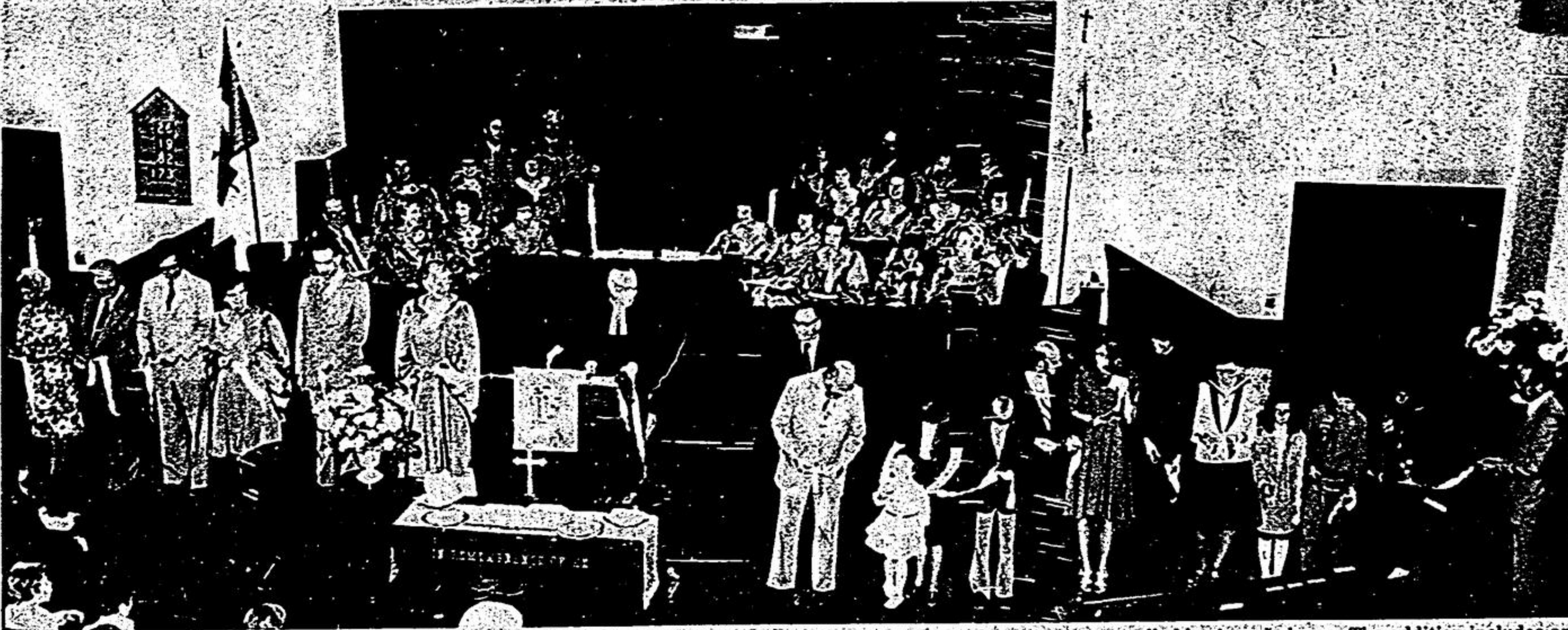
Church fund raising

The Stouffville United Church has put a new wing on the church that was opened Sunday, May 29.

The money that was raised for the project came from various fund raising campaigns. There was a bake sale and auction last fall. A bake sale at the recent country fair brought in \$300.

The women of the United Church raised some money when they fed the CBC crew while they were filming at the gravel pits on the 7th conc. The CGIT, donated some of the money they raised in their Starvation, Jim Richards, head of the fund raising campaign, said that "it will be a while before the goal is reached and it will be slower during the summer months as nothing has been planned as of yet. There were many large donations at the start but we can't depend on them now."

The first price quoted to the fund raisers was \$156,000, but then there was the extra cost of a very important steel beam added on which brought the price up by \$20,000. After the other costs were added in and the donations taken off the balance now rests at \$350,000.



Congregation of Stouffville United Church enjoyed a mass ribbon cutting Sunday morning to officially open the extension built onto the structure. A ribbon had to be produced at short notice as the one slated to be cut somehow mysteriously disappeared after being stretched out in place. A plaque commemorating the addition was unveiled by Anne Lehman. The addition includes an elevator chair which allows the infirm to attend worship services with ease.
