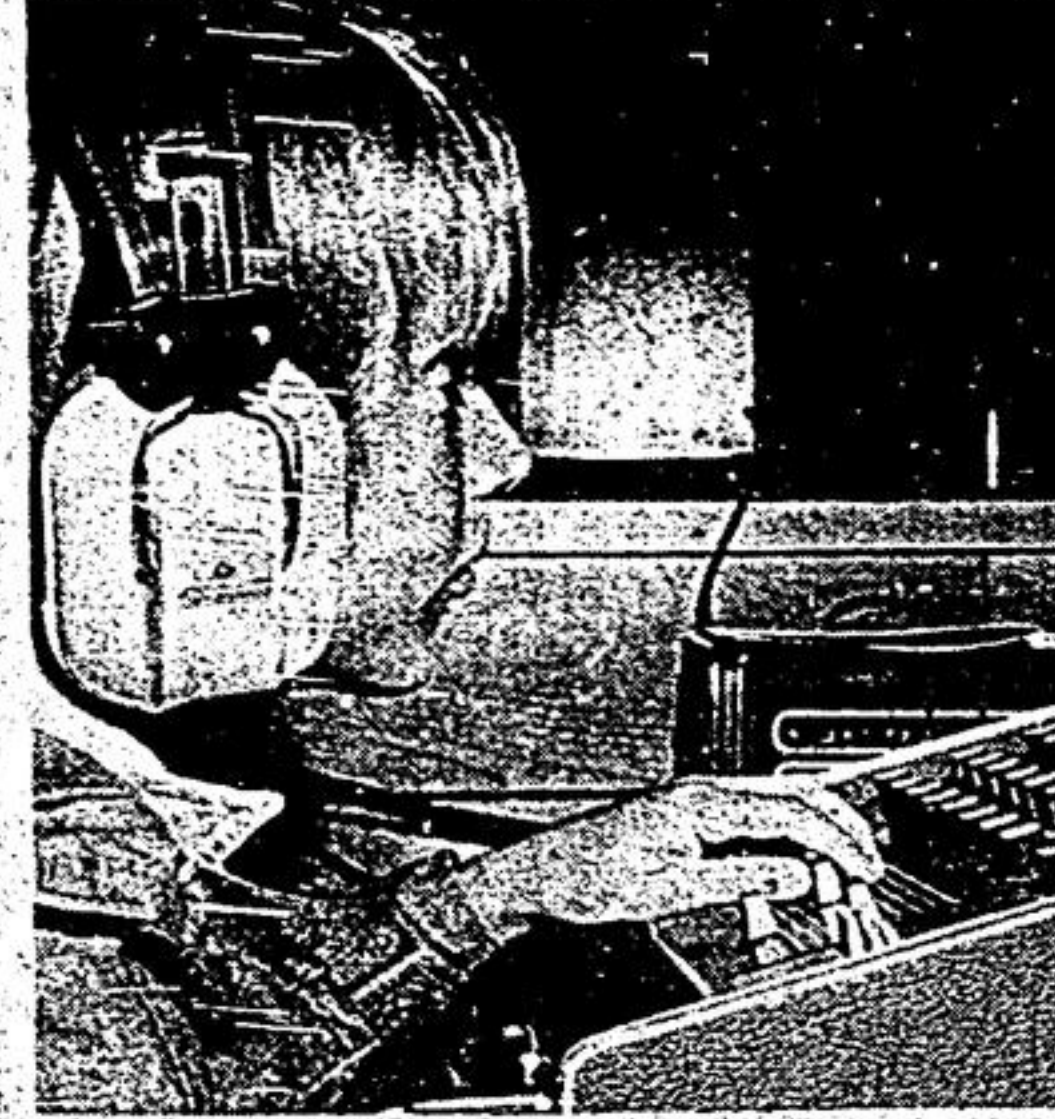
'Twilight Concert' at public school

Weather is affecting crops

Fast changes in the weather are affecting crops in unusual ways. Corn, for example, is showing some scald symptoms. Bleached patches are on the leaves, but this should be just a temporary setback.

The combination of very cold weather and weed control chemicals is more worrying. Herbicides used for grass control, put on after the corn was up, burned leaves in some fields, last week, with night temperatures going almost to freezing.

The growing point on affected corn should still be alright, so new leaves will appear, but the delay will affect the crop.

Some spotting on barley leaves was evident last week too. Again, unusually high temperatures are respon-

sible, and there should be no really serious effect. Alfalfa weevils were more numerous than ever this year. Many fields were cut early to save the crop, and now the second crop has to be watched. There is only one brood per year of this insect, but there may still be eggs to hatch in the stubble. It doesn't take very many weevils to strip the new growth, so if they are evident, the stubble should be sprayed.

Furadan, Methoxychlor or Sevin can be used in the weed sprayer, providing it will put on around 15 gallons of spray per acre. Material cost ranges from about \$1 to \$3.50 per acre.

More and more of our hay crop is being put up as haylage. This keeps the highest possible feed value in the hay, providing it doesn't overheat. Overheating will only occur if the chopped hay doesn't pack tight enough, and if the moisture level is kept between 60 and 70 percent, there should be no problem.

It isn't easy to get a whole silo filled at the right moisture, but the advantages are worth a real effort. A moisture tester helps. We can do tests at our office, or suggest testers for the job.

A program is in place now for rural countryside improvement. Funds are available from our ministry for municipalities to remove dead trees, weeds, derelict buildings, or to build fences on either public or private property. Anyone interested can get further details from township offices, or our office in Newmarket.
